There has been a change to much colder weather in the North and Middle Atlantic states. The weather is cloudy and unsettled in Texas and temperatures are somewhat higher this morning. Unsettled weather is indicated for this vicinity during the next 36 hours, with rain tonight or Sunday, higher temperature tonight and colder weather Sunday.
