that the railroad recognize the federated organization of shop employees.

Decision Expected Soon.
It is believed that one of these alternatives will soon be decided upon. All the delegates have, it is said, expressed themselves in favor of giving the railroad company 30 days' notice of the abrogation of wage contracts. If this action is decided on, the question of calling a strike will be indefinitely delayed.

Local heads of the shopmen have wired their representatives at San Francisco for advice and it is expected they will be guided to a certain extent by the answer received to this message. The labor chiefs declined to discuss their pending action today although several important conferences were held at which the entire situation was carefully considered.

May Employ Strikebreakers.
Chicago, Ill., Sept. 1.—A report that an employment agency had signed 500 strikebreakers for immediate use on the Harriman lines, was brought to the attention of the labor men today, but they declined to comment on it. The labor chiefs profess to still hope for a peaceful settlement of their differences.

Vacations Canceled.
Omaha, Neb., Sept. 1.—A general order was issued from Union Pacific headquarters today canceling all vacation orders for the balance of the year. No reason was assigned for the action, but it is understood to be a part of the general retrenchment scheme of the company. A large portion of the employees of the road are affected.

Denver Asks Reconsideration.
Denver, Sept. 1.—The Denver chamber of commerce yesterday adopted resolutions urging the shop employees of the Union Pacific and a number of other railroads "again to consider seriously the questions involved and refrain from precipitating a contest in which their position might not be supported by public opinion."

They also assert that a strike now, when large crops and other heavy tonnage in the state of Colorado must be moved by the railroads involved, would seriously injure the business interests of the state.

DOUBLE KILLING AT LOS ANGELES

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 1.—Dr. Walter Owen Ryan, said to have been a wealthy physician, formerly of Springfield, Ill., shot and killed his wife and then committed suicide at their home here today.

Dr. Ryan shot his wife while the couple were at breakfast. Two young sons who were upstairs, heard the shots and found the body of their mother in the hallway and their father bent over the breakfast table, dead.

C. D. Ryan, one of the boys, told the police his father recently had shown signs of unbalanced mind. His mother visited a lawyer yesterday for advice.

COLORADO MAN WANDERS AIMLESSLY; IS FINALLY FOUND

Colorado Springs, Colo., Sept. 1.—Howard P. Seades, of Cripple Creek, a prominent mine operator and secretary of the Cripple Creek lodge of Elks, was found here today wandering aimlessly about the streets. He has been absent from the gold camps since Tuesday morning and is unable to give any account of his actions. He was taken to a hospital for medical treatment.

GENERAL YARDMASTER HELD AS LEADER OF ROBBERS.

Salt Lake City, Sept. 1.—S. A. Sutton, general yardmaster of the Denver & Rio Grande in this city, is under arrest on the charge of being the leader of a gang of box car burglars, which has stolen thousands of dollars' worth of merchandise consigned to local stores and San Francisco firms. Other arrests are expected today.

ALLEGED WIRE TAPERS ARRESTED IN SALT LAKE

Salt Lake City, Utah, Sept. 1.—Dewitt Lowe, a broker, was arrested today on the charge of tapping a telegraph wire operated by the firm of "Badger Bros." Four other men were also arrested on the same charge. They are: E. L. May, Ray Perkins, J. F. McAllister and R. L. Scott.

TO EXTEND MOFFAT RAILROAD WESTERLY

Grand Junction, Colo., Sept. 1.—Plans for the Utah extension of the Denver, Northwestern & Pacific (Moffat) railroad, are well under way, according to Frederick Brind, who has been investigating the possibilities of such a road in the Uintah basin on behalf of the foreign syndicate, which it is said will furnish the needed money. According to Brind the Uintah railway will be a part of the new line, the directors having decided to tunnel the Book Cliffs next spring at a cost of \$1,250,000, eliminating the present heavy grades and to extend the road to the Colorado-Utah line to develop the new oil and asphalt districts of the two states

BAILEY'S GHOST AGAIN.

Editor El Paso Herald:
The objection which Hon. W. R. Fonda urges against Arizona joining in the proposed statehood jubilee to be given by El Paso to Arizona and New Mexico is not altogether well taken. I share with him the opinion that senator Bailey did Arizona a great wrong and one which he can never remedy, but El Paso is not responsible for senator Bailey. Senator Bailey does not represent the Democratic party and has not for several years. He is first aid to the standpat Republicans and the representative of all those interests that prey on the people.

If senator Bailey really represented the Democratic party of this state or of the nation, three-fourths of those who now give allegiance to that party would be hunting their associations. While it is true that the local organization here has endorsed the senator on several occasions, those endorsements are due more largely to an appreciation of senator Bailey's supposed assistance in the Elephant Butte project than because of agreement with his policies. As one of the numerous Democrats of El Paso and of the great state of Texas, who have no part or parcel with senator Bailey, who deutes that he represents Democratic sentiment or Democratic policies, who sympathized with Arizona in her long, magnificent and just fight for statehood, and who is voting, working and praying for the time when we shall be able to rid ourselves and our state of Bailey and everything he stands for, I beg our Arizona brethren not to charge against El Paso any of Mr. Bailey's sins, plentiful as they are. While there was and is a difference of opinion among our citizenship as to the wisdom of the recall, to which Mr. Bailey objected, we are always the friends of Arizona.

We are linked to Arizona by every tie of brotherhood and community of interest, and we ask every Arizonian to come to El Paso and take part in this jubilee, promising when the primaries occur next summer we shall show you that Texas Democracy no more endorses senator Bailey's action in this instance than does Arizona; in fact, we confidently look forward to that time when Imperial Texas shall be done forever with Bailey and Baileyism. He is not a Democrat, and I for one protest against the Democratic party being charged with his sins, although he was elected by a Democratic legislature.

Forget Mr. Bailey. His undemocratic action should not detract our Arizona friends from joining us in celebrating the fact that she is now one of the sisterhood of states and can amend her constitution to suit herself, irrespective of senator Bailey, president Taft or anybody else.
