CHARGE PENDING; NAMED POLICEMAN

Man Accused of Buying Poll Tax Receipts Placed on City Force

Eugene Hennessy has been appointed a policeman. Hennessy was formerly a watchman at the El Paso and Southwestern building. On July 28, complaint was filed in the court of justice E. B. McClintock by J. L. Campbell, charging Hennessy with violating the election law. The case has not been dismissed on the court docket and McClintock says it has not been dismissed. The complaint against Hennessy was

filed by Campbell following the prohibition election, it being charged that the Southwestern watchman had secured poll tax receipts for employees of the Southwestern and that these poll taxes were not paid by the persons to whom they were issued. Volney M. Brown said Tuesday morning that he did not know what would be done with the case. He was employed by the pros to prosecute.

Five other men have also been appointed policemen. They are: Tom Hughes, day jailer, and the following patrolmen: Tom York, T. W. Kiaman, M. Gonzalez, H. B. Garcia. The police commissioners who appointed Hennessy and the other men are: F. B. Simmons, Z. T. White, W. Cooley, Dr. J. B. Brady, Lamar Davis.

MADERO'S POLICY AS VIJJOEN SEES

Says Navarro Is in Army on Expedition to Sinaloa

B. J. Vijjoen returned Tuesday morning from Mexico City, after spending more than a month with Francisco I. Madero as his guest. Mrs. Vijjoen was with him. Abolition of any semblance of dictatorship by the adoption of the French parliamentary system, in which the president is practically the prime minister; elimination of all forms of military rule by reorganizing the army into a small but compact unit, with a nation wide national guard; compulsory education for the masses and the expenditure of large amounts for public schools; no reelection to the presidency; division of landed estates where the title is faulty, and the establishment of a democracy of the people and for the people, he says, is the policy Madero will carry out.

Madero has bought a plantation near Mexico City, to which Vijjoen says he intends to retire at the expiration of his presidential term. "Madero spoke often and feelingly of the friendship which El Paso and El Paso people had shown in the past for himself and his cause," he said. "As soon as he is elected president he will make a trip to Chihuahua, Juarez and Sonora, probably passing through El Paso on his way to the northwestern border states."

Gen. Juan Navarro, the commander of the forces in Juarez which opposed Madero's men, is now reinstated in the army, Vijjoen says, and is in charge of an expedition which has been sent to Sinaloa to quell the rebellion there. Navarro, Vijjoen says, is a loyal supporter of the man who saved his life in Juarez.

FOURTEEN ENTER PLEAS OF GUILTY

Thirteen of Them Are Sentenced in County Court Tuesday

Fourteen pleas of guilty were entered in the county court Tuesday morning. Thirteen, charged with theft, were sentenced as follows: R. Maldonado, one day in county jail; Alvarado Cruz, 20 days; Guadalupe Magallares, 10 days; Emilio Flores, 20 days; Domingo Gomez, 20 days; A. J. Smith, 10 days; Raul Perez, 20 days; Jesus Diaz, 20 days; Earl Corcoran, 20 days; Leon Reyes, 10 days; Adamo Maese, 10 days; Amelino Romero, 10 days. O. E. Bery, charged with swindling E. Edmiston by giving him a check for \$15 on the City National bank, where he had no funds, was sentenced to serve five days in the county jail. R. Maldonado, who received the lightest sentence, one day in the county jail, pleaded guilty to a charge of taking a bolt of cloth worth \$5 from I. Laskin. Most of these men have been in jail for over a month, and for that reason the sentences imposed are light.

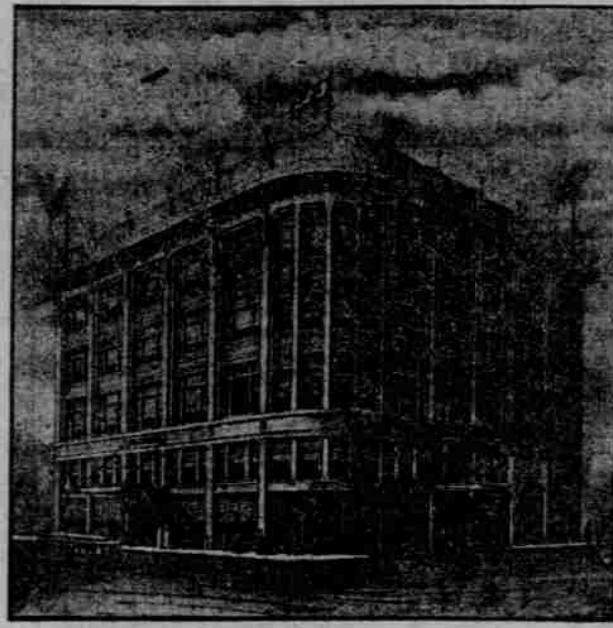

JUAREZ OFFICIALS FEED 500 HUNGRY

Horde of Idle Peons Flock There Seeking Work and Food

Nearly 500 more Mexican laborers were the guests of the Ciudad Juarez officials at lunch Tuesday in the bull ring, which is now called hotel Campa. Some of the laborers arrived in the city from the southern part of Mexico this morning and are seeking work while many of them have returned from the United States and say that they have been unable to secure work. Those who have no place to go have been allowed to stay at the bull ring while in the city. The laborers who arrived from the south Tuesday morning will go to the United States to try and find employment. The 250 laborers who made the demonstration in Ciudad Juarez Monday were fed at the city's expense. The Mexican consul obtained transportation for them over the Mexican National railroad and they returned to their homes in Irapuato and Vera Cruz on Monday evening's train.

SAY DOCTOR LEFT PATIENT TO DIE

El Paso Physician Alleged to Have Deserted Suffering Woman

An American physician from El Paso is said to have left a mother whom he was attending in Ciudad Juarez soon after the birth of a child Monday and as a result both the mother and the child died. The American physician was called to 5 Calle Ramon Ortiz to attend the Mexican woman and gave her chloroform while the child was being born, but when he saw the woman could not live through the ordeal, he is alleged to have deserted her. Dr. Antonio Sarabia, of the Libertad hospital, was called and, although he arrived a few minutes later, the woman and child had already died.

VARGAS ELECTED TO LEGISLATURE

Sebastian Vargas, sr. will be the member of the legislature from the district of Bravos, as returns have been received from the recent state election which shows senior Vargas to be the winner. The known returns show Vargas' majority to be only four votes, but the election returns from the Galana region were sent to Chihuahua and in this place Vargas had a majority of nearly 1000 votes.

JUAREZ POLICE TO BE GIVEN UNIFORMS

The Ciudad Juarez police will be uniformed during the next few weeks. Chief of police Rafael Campa is now negotiating to have the uniforms made for the men. Since the new police force has been in the service they have been wearing khaki clothes and helmets, but these are not heavy enough for winter wear. Chief Campa would like to uniform his men like the Portugal police, who wear high top patent leather boots, white trousers and tight jackets, but the men object.

WISH TO HOLD A MEETING FOR REYES

The Reyes club's president, Juan Hernandez, of Juarez, a son of Gen. Hernandez who had charge of the federal troops in Chihuahua city during the revolution, wants to hold public meetings in the Juarez streets and have speeches in support of Reyes, but the authorities think that the meetings might cause trouble and are loath to let them be held.

TROOPS IN JUAREZ ARE GIVEN GENERAL INSPECTION

A general inspection of the insurgent troops in Ciudad Juarez has been held on orders received from Mexico City by the military authorities. All of the soldiers were gathered at the cuartel where their equipment and guns were inspected by the officers.

JUAREZ POLICE MAKE RAID AND ARREST TWO CHINAMEN
