MOTHER GIVES UP HER FIGHT FOR BOY

Mother and Grandmother Leave Rich Young Adams With His Father at Tucson.

Says a Tucson dispatch in the Los Angeles Examiner of Thursday: Believing that San Francisco detectives employed by Mrs. John S. Kimball are planning to kidnap his 11-year-old son, his mother and grandmother have agreed to remain in his charge by the district court of Tucson, Louis B. Adams has employed two officers.

Mrs. Kimball and Daisy Kimball Adams, her daughter, have abandoned their fight in the Arizona courts to secure the custody of Mrs. Adams's young son and, accompanied by their lawyers and a number of detectives brought to Arizona to aid them, left tonight for San Francisco.

At the hearing of the habeas corpus proceedings brought by Mrs. Kimball before judge Campbell in the United States district court here, attorneys for Mrs. Kimball admitted that the guardianship papers were issued to her in San Francisco, 3, through a misunderstanding. The court held that these proceedings had no effect in Arizona, but signified a willingness to determine which of the parents should be given the child, if the petition of Mrs. Kimball were amended to allege that Adams was unfit to have the custody of him.

Mrs. Adams, however, refused to take the stand and tell of the indignities which she claimed had been heaped upon her by her husband, and having no other evidence her attorneys abandoned their fight for the boy.

COMPROMISES A SUIT FOR QUITE A LARGE SUM.

Waxahatche, Texas, Feb. 12.—George Hickman today received \$20,000 cash in settlement of a suit against the Houston and Texas Central which road he sued for \$55,000 and obtained judgment for that amount from the district court. The company appealed, but a compromise was reached today. Hickman lost his hands and feet in a railroad accident.

Tangier, Morocco, Feb. 12.—It is reported here that Raisuli, governor of Djehala province, and former Moorish bandit chief, is dead as a result of being poisoned.

FORMER SHERIFF IS FOUND DYING FROM POISON DOSE.

Shreveport, La., Feb. 12.—Former sheriff A. B. McFadden was found nearly frozen to death, unconscious and critically ill from a dose of poison in the woods near Ruston today by searching parties. Mayfield was recently indicted, charged with being short in his accounts.
