REPORTS FROM SEATTLE

Seattle, Wash., March 5.—A special from Revelstoke, British Columbia, says between 60 and 100 lives were lost in a snow slide that buried two rotary snowplows in Rogers' pass two miles east of Glacier at 1 o'clock this morning.

SECOND SLIDE IMMINENT
