THE MAN HIGHER UP

SENATOR GORE SAYS NATIONAL COMMITTEEMAN JOHN HAMON OFFERED HIM BRIBE — VICE PRESIDENT INVOLVED.

Muskogee, Okla., Aug. 4.—Senator Thomas P. Gore was the first witness called in the congressional investigation today on the charges made by the senator on the floor of the senate that he had been offered a bribe of \$50,000 in connection with the McMurray Indian land contracts. Senator Gore named John Hamon, national committeeman from Oklahoma, as the man who called on him in the interest of the measure. Gore said Hamon was seated beside Congressman Bird McGuire. He said an official higher up was interested. Chairman Burke pressed Gore for the name of the official, and Gore declared it was Vice President Sherman. He produced newspaper clippings showing that Sherman and Curtis had called on the president recommending approval of the contracts. Gore said Hamon offered him \$50,000 and said the sum might be made \$55,000, and detailed the transaction.

A FAMILY WIPED OUT

TENEMENT FIRE IN HOBOKEN THIS MORNING CLAIMED THE LIVES OF AN ENTIRE FAMILY. FIREMEN INJURED.

Hoboken, N. Y., Aug. 4.—A fire in a tenement house here today resulted in wiping out an entire family, and a volunteer fireman, attempting to rescue the victims, was fatally injured. The blaze swept a three-story tenement building, pinning Louis and Mary Biasetti and their children in their rooms on the second floor, where they burned to death. Oscar Weiss attempted to go to the rescue of the ill-fated family and inhaled the flames and will die.

CALLS FOR BATTLESHIPS

Italian Representative in Honduras Cables His Government to Send Battleships.

Puerto Cortez, Aug. 4.—Fighting and the revolutionary army demonstrations have grown to such a serious nature and extent all over Honduras that Americans have fled to the United States consulate at Tegulgalpa seeking protection. A score of soldiers tore down the Italian flag and one Italian was killed. The Duke of Syella, Italian representative, is enraged at the occurrence and has cabled his country to send warships without delay.

CAMPBELL PARTNERSHIP.

Judge Gill of Houston Would Like to Have Him as a Partner.

Houston, Texas, Aug. 3.—In regard to the report that Governor Campbell would become a member of the law firm of Hogg, Gill & Jones of Houston and make this city his residence at the expiration of his term of office, Judge W. H. Gill, senior member of the firm, stated today that, while the report was not authorized by him, he would be very glad to become associated in that manner with Governor Campbell. Judge Gill stated further that he had asked the governor to become a member of the firm six months ago, but that he had never indicated what his action would be. Judge Gill hoped the report was true.

JAPANESE MURDERER

SUSPECTED OF KILLING MAN AND WIFE AND SON IS BEING SOUGHT BY THE POLICE ALONG THE PACIFIC COAST.

Santa Rosa, Cal., Aug. 4.—Police departments along the Pacific coast have been asked today to take into custody Henry Yamuchi, a Japanese, following the finding on the Starbuck ranch of the bones of three bodies, believed to be those of Enoch Kendall and his wife and son, Thomas. The Kendall family disappeared three weeks ago. That the bones are those of the missing family is strengthened by the finding of two finger rings, one of them a wedding ring bearing the initials T. A. K. Assistant District Attorney Hoyle and Sheriff Smith found the bones late yesterday afternoon when they went to the home to investigate the disappearance. Mrs. Starbuck, owner of the ranch, says Yamuchi had been driven away a few days before the Kendalls disappeared. That the disappearance of the family was sudden is indicated by a portion of untouched meat found on the table where it had been served. The finding of the bones yesterday revealed the most brutal murder in the history of California. The bones had been scraped and the flesh fed to hogs. Attorney Hoyle said this afternoon that he was unwilling at this time to discuss the identity of the murderer.

Cannon Has No Comment.

He said he had nothing to say at this time, beside the final returns when in might show a different result. When the vote is counted he says he may have something to say. Anyway, he reminded the correspondent that there were primaries in Oklahoma and Missouri, as well as in Kansas.

INVESTIGATING LORIMER

Chicago Tribune Says Sole Object of Senator Crane's Visit West is to Report on Lorimer.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 4.—This morning's Tribune says Senator Crane's mission west is for no other purpose than to ascertain the personal and political status of Senator Lorimer. The Tribune is the bitter enemy of Lorimer and exposed the alleged democratic vote buying to land Lorimer in the United States senate. According to the Tribune, Crane talked to some forty or fifty business and professional men in Chicago regarding the charges made against Lorimer. It is supposed he will later make a report to President Taft.
