## LATHAM'S BIG STUNT

FLEW FROM CHALONS SUR SAONE TO ISSY, DISTANCE OF 130 MILES, IN THREE HOURS, AND WON FALCO PRIZE.

Paris, Aug. 12.—Parisians were aroused today by the sensational flight over the city by Hubert Latham, in an Antionette monoplane. He flew from Chalons sur Saone to Issy, a distance of one hundred and thirty miles, in three hours, passing over Paris at a height varying from three hundred to one thousand feet. He circled Eiffel tower and passed up the boulevard, almost scraping the roofs of houses. He descended at noon at Issy. His achievement gave him the Falco prize of \$2000.

## GEORGE SCOTT TESTIFIES

Before the Gore Investigating Committee, Now Sitting in Sulphur, Oklahoma.

Sulphur, Okla., Aug. 12.—For the first time since the investigation into the Gore charges started in Oklahoma the fair sex was represented by the presence of a number of wealthy women. In the crowd present at the hearing today were women, Indians, congressmen and other spectators. George Scott, son-in-law of Chief Green McCurtain, was the first witness called this morning. He denied that McMurray was to pay him for his services in behalf of having the McMurray contracts approved, saying that he was interested only in a general way in seeing the Indian affairs settled. He made this declaration in the face of the fact that it was shown that he had given up his position as McCurtain's secretary at a salary of \$1800. Scott said he was not reimbursed for the payment of telegrams sent to Washington or for his trip there in the interest of the contracts. The evidence this morning tended to show the simplicity of the Indians. When Scott was on the stand it was shown that the Indians were willing to sign away their rights to millions of dollars where they would be unwilling to sign tax contracts because the latter calls for the immediate payment of \$10.

**PUSHING LIQUOR BILLS.**

Lower Legislative House Losing No Time Along This Line.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 11.—At this afternoon's session of the house Justo Penn was sworn in as a member from Webb county as the successor to C. C. Pearce, deceased.

Discussion was then resumed on the express liquor bill. The main contention was over an amendment exempting an express agent from liability unless he "knowingly" violated the act. A roll call on the amendment revealed the fact that no quorum was present and a call of the house was ordered.

The committee on liquor traffic met this afternoon and reported favorably the anti-treating bill and other liquor bills introduced at the morning session.

Speaker Marshall announced this afternoon that he had advised from Senator Bailey to the effect that he would not be here tomorrow evening to address the legislature.

Shortly after 3 o'clock a quorum was secured and the proposed amendment was defeated. Several other amendments were proposed by the anti for the evident purpose of destroying its effectiveness. All were voted down and the bill was passed finally.

**Fort Davis For Sale.**

San Antonio, Texas, Aug. 11.—Fort Davis, at one time the only protection against Indians and bandits on the El Paso-San Antonio road, is being offered for sale by the government. Though the old fort is one of the landmarks of West Texas and many a fine tale of romance, heroism and narrow escape is pinned to it, it will now pass out of existence.

## ESTRADA ON MOVE

REVOLUTIONARY PRESIDENT OF NICARAGUA JOINS HIS ARMY ON ITS MARCH AGAINST THE CITY OF MANAGUA.

Bluefields, Nicaragua, Aug. 12.—Messages from General Mena, in command of the revolutionary troops who are advancing on Managua, are so encouraging that Provisional President Estrada left today for Granada and expects to direct the siege against Madriz's capital. It is believed the Estrada troops will surround Managua next week, and it is understood President Madriz has a boat commissioned in which to make his escape in case Estrada's forces are successful.

## TEXAS NEWS NOTES.

Governor Campbell submits a message to the house recommending a new charter for San Antonio.

The senate committee has deferred action on the ten-mile bill until Aug. 18.

Albert Grant Hurling of Dallas was killed by a street car.

The house resents the action of the state convention in its demand for an early adjournment of the legislature.

A resolution to adjourn August 15 was offered in the senate.

Otto Karney of Hallettsville was drowned while fishing.

The traffic agents of the International and Great Northern road will meet in Galveston today.

## MAYOR IS RESTING EASY

Doctors Will Hold Another General Conference Tonight—Good Night's Sleep.

Hoboken, N. J., Aug. 12.—The physicians of St. Mary's Hospital issued the following bulletin this morning: "Mayor Gaynor passed a good night, and is sleeping this morning. His general condition is excellent. Temperature shows 100, pulse 70 and respiration 16."

Arrangements have been made to have an operating surgeon in constant attendance on account of the apprehension that the bullet wound may show signs of infection. Several of the doctors maintain that X-ray photographs in such a case do not indicate the exact lateral position and that it would be unsafe to attempt an operation. Another general consultation will be held by the physicians tonight. Gaynor ate a hearty breakfast this morning.

A later bulletin says: "The mayor has passed a comfortable morning and has taken nourishment well. He is steadily improving." The mayor went to sleep at 10 o'clock and was still asleep at 1:30. Young Gaynor, son of the mayor, said this afternoon that the doctors had assured him that unless infection set in, which was not apprehended, his father would surely recover.

## ALDRICH SAW PRESIDENT

And After Short Interview Beat It For His Private Yacht and Lost the Newspaper Men.

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 12.—Senator Nelson Aldrich, aboard his private yacht, slipped into Beverly early today and interrupted the president while he was at breakfast. They talked over the political situation for some thirty minutes, when Aldrich slipped back to his boat, evading the newspaper men who had learned of his presence. His boat at once pulled out of the harbor. The president has arranged to see Secretary of the Treasury McVeagh and Postmaster General Hitchcock today.
