I. & G. N. TRAFFIC AGENTS TEN MILE BILL BURIED

Meet in Galveston Today For the Purpose of Getting Ready to Handle the Cotton Crop. Measure Will Not Be Recalled Until August Eighteenth Unless By Special Resolution.

San Antonio, Texas, Aug. 11.—For the purpose of making plans to handle the cotton crop with promptness this fall, the agents of the traffic department of the International and Great Northern railroad, together with the station agents at all junction points and compress points, will meet in Galveston Friday. J. M. Ball, general agent; P. A. Sullivan, commercial agent, and H. Issard, traveling freight agent of the road at San Antonio, left tonight to attend.

General Agent Ball of this city said, before leaving tonight, the cotton crop in Texas promises to be a record breaker and unusual preparations will have to be made this fall to handle

Austin, Texas, Aug. 11.—Senate judiciary committee No. 2 today buried the "House Ten Mile bill" and it will not be resurrected until August 18, unless the pro members can secure the adoption of a resolution in the senate instructing the committee to report the bill.

it. It will probably require all of the rolling stock that the road would be able to muster to keep the cotton from becoming congested at compress points. The crop is already moving at a lively rate from Southwest Texas. It is probable that in the territory contiguous to San Antonio there has been fifteen hundred bales ginned. By Monday every gin in this section will be running full time every day, and some of them will have to put on night shifts. What cotton has been ginned is being rushed to the market. There seems to be no tendency to hold for any higher prices; with spots selling at better than 14c the growers seem to be satisfied to let go just as quickly as possible.

resolution tomorrow instructing the committee to report the bill out for consideration by the senate.

The house ten mile bill is more drastic than that pending in the senate on an adverse majority report from the committee. The house bill not only prohibits the selling of liquor within ten miles of the university, its branch (Galveston), and the A. & M. College (Bryan), but includes all state educational institutions supported in whole or in part from the state's revenue.

When the bill came up Senator Watson moved to postpone it indefinitely or until "next Christmas," but finally made the date August 18th, which would kill the bill.

Senator Sturgeon moved that it be reported favorably. He and Senator Cofer insisted that the better policy is to report the bill out of committee and give every senator a chance to vote on same, and not smother it, as proposed.

The motion to report favorably was lost, 2 ayes, 5 noes. Senators Cofer and Sturgeon voted

in the affirmative, while the noes were Hudspeth, Real, Senter, Watson and Murray.

The bill was postponed to August 18th by the same vote.

Following this action notice was given of the intention to offer a resolution tomorrow instructing the committee to report the bill.

There were some pleasantries passed about the Galveston platform.

Senator Sturgeon said the bill would be seen next January, and Senator Cofer remarked that possibly it would come up again in November, his intimation being that a called session would be held in November when the new senate is elected and which will have seventeen pros.

ANOTHER MESSAGE.

Governor is Expected to Submit Further Legislation.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 11.—Some members of the legislature profess to believe that, notwithstanding the ninth plank of the Galveston convention advising the legislature to adjourn and go home, the governor is preparing to send in a red hot document in a few days calling upon the solons to act upon the subjects submitted and respond to the demands of the constituents. It is said that the prospective message may be along the lines of his famous "Easter message" which was sent to the senate on Easter Sunday of last year. Such a message might be popular with a majority of the house, but would hardly prove pleasant to a majority of the senate. The story goes that the executive is getting his neck bowed and may explode in the form of a tabasco message.
