HUNDREDS OF PERSONS DROWN IN JAPAN FLOOD

(Herald Special.)

Tokio, Japan, Aug. 13.—Hundreds of persons have been drowned, scores are pinned under the debris of their homes, and at least two million people in Japan are facing starvation as

a result of the great floods that are prevailing. One-third of Tokio proper is submerged and rain is still falling and the water is rising rapidly. The conditions throughout the empire are alarming.

PEOPLE FLEEING A CHANGE IN FRONT

FOREST FIRES THREATEN MANY TOWNS IN IDAHO AND NORTHWEST—FAMILIES ARE BEING RUSHED TO SPOKANE.

Wallace, Idaho, Aug. 13.—The towns of Wallace, Mullan and Murray especially are in danger of destruction by the forest fires which are sweeping through the Coeur d'Alene district. There is no sign that the fires can be checked, and preparations are making today to send the women and children to Spokane. At Wallace the people are fleeing because the towns in imminent danger of burning.

ADMINISTRATION HAS MAPPED OUT A PROGRAM TO SAVE REPUBLICAN PARTY IN THE COMING ELECTION.

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 13.—In order to appease the progressive movement and insure republican victory in the November elections, the Taft advisers have practically agreed to the following plan: Secretary of the Interior Ballinger will be permitted to resign by September the 15th. Senator Aldrich and Speaker Cannon will be eliminated from the administration council, and an entente cordiale will be established between the house insurgents and the senate and administration senators. Senator Crane will be the official adviser, vice Postmaster General Hitchcock. This change in the attitude of the administration follows certain events taking place here yesterday in connection with the visit of Aldrich, and became known today through authoritative sources. This plan is generally accredited in Washington.

RIOTING IS SERIOUS

POLICE HUNTING STRIKE-BREAKER WHO IS BELIEVED TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR SHOOTING IN COLUMBUS.

Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 13.—John F. Brady, a strike-breaker, is being sought by the police today as the man who is thought to be responsible for the shooting last night and wounding of a number of people. Among those injured are Mrs. Charles Kelly, shot in the knee; her daughter, Helen Kelly, aged ten, shot in the shoulder, and Mrs. Charles Hart, shot in the shoulder. The shooting occurred during the rioting last night following the revolt of almost two score of policemen to mount cars and do guard duty. Every quarter of the city is the scene of renewed outbreaks today, and it is predicted that the troops will be recalled to the capital at once.

LYON EXPLAINS HOW

He Became Connected With the McMurray Deal—Says He Was Acting in Good Faith.

Sulphur, Okla., Aug. 13.—Cecil Lyon of Texas, on the witness stand in the Gore investigation today, said: "I agreed to become interested as a business man with a law firm. I knew that McMurray, Mansfield and Cornish had been indicted, but friends came to me and said that the Oklahoma men had been unjustly indicted and that if the matter was fairly presented the indictments would be dismissed. I finally agreed to take the matter up and went to Washington to see President Roosevelt, who granted me an interview. I was not and am not interested in the present McMurray contracts."

Cholera in Russia.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 12.—From July 31 until August 6, 29,658 cases of cholera were reported throughout Russia, with 8679 deaths.

MAYOR GROWS JOGULAR

New York Mayor Slept Eight Hours Last Night, and Feels Much Better Today.

Hoboken, N. J., Aug. 13.—A bulletin issued this morning says the following concerning Mayor Gaynor's condition: "Mayor Gaynor's condition is gratifying this morning. He slept eight hours last night." His temperature this morning was 100-1.5. The mayor joked with Doctors Stewart and Arlt while they changed the bandages. The wound is doing nicely and there is no sign of infection. The mayor ate a substantial breakfast and discussed current affairs with Secretary Adamson.

A bulletin issued at 12:30 reads: "Gaynor passed a comfortable morning. He has taken sufficient nourishment, and is steadily gaining strength."

HIGH WIND INTERFERED

With Program of Cross Country Flight in France Today.
