

CARRIED TO CROCKETT

EIGHT PRISONERS HELD IN CONNECTION WITH NEGRO KILLINGS WILL BE GIVEN AN EXAMINING TRIAL AT CROCKETT.

Last night Sheriff Lacy and deputies of Houston county were here to secure the eight white men held on indictments here in connection with the negro killings in the southern part of the county, and they were carried to Crockett via the night train. These men will be subject to an examining trial at Crockett today before a justice of the peace for the killing of a negro in Houston county. The negro was killed about the time the negroes were killed in this county, being a victim of the trouble down there. The scene of the Houston county killing is just across the county line, near the place where the other negroes were killed.

District Attorney Tom Harris went down this morning, to be present and to represent the state in the trial, while Judge Ned Morris went down as an attorney for the defendants.

Remanded Without Bail.

The men were returned from Crockett on the early afternoon train, accompanied by Sheriff Lacy and two rangers. At Crockett an examination was waived and the men were remanded to jail without bail. It is presumed the two Houston county men will await the action of the grand jury.

EAGLES MEET IN ST. LOUIS

Twenty Thousand Members and Visitors Already on Hand For the National Convention.

(Herald Special.)

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 22.—All day long delegates and visitors have been arriving in large numbers to participate in the eleventh annual national convention of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, which will begin its business sessions tomorrow morning in this city. At the convention headquarters it is estimated that twenty thousand members and visitors are already on hand, while large additions are expected during the late hours tonight and early tomorrow morning.

The public buildings, hotels and business houses are lavishly decorated with bunting and fluttering signs of welcome for the visitors. The program of entertainment has been mapped out on an elaborate scale and nothing is to be left undone that will contribute to the pleasure of the Eagles, their families and friends, during their stay in the city.

During the day the various officers and committees have been hard at work completing their reports and putting the finishing touches to the convention arrangements. Frank E. Hering of Indiana, grand worthy president of the order, will call the gathering to order and respond to the welcoming addresses. Mr. Hering will be succeeded in the presidency this year by Thomas F. Grady, the well known lawyer and politician of New York.

The annual reports of the officers will show the Eagles to be in a most flourishing condition, both numerically and financially. There are now nearly two thousand subordinate lodges in the United States and Canada, and the total membership exceeds 300,000. During the past ten years the subordinate bodies have invested \$6,000,000 in fraternal temples and club rooms. Six million dollars have been disbursed to members as sick benefits during the period, and over \$1,000,000 has been paid in funeral benefits.
