FAST TRAINS ROASTED IN COLLISION REGULARS

ENGINEER AND FIREMAN OF BIG FOUR PASSENGER TRAIN WERE KILLED OUTRIGHT, AND THIRTEEN OTHERS INJURED.

(Herald Special.) Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 12.—Samuel Densmore, engineer, and E. C. Icke, fireman, were killed this morning and thirteen other persons were injured when a Big Four passenger train collided with a Big Four special, by going through an open switch. The collision occurred within the city limits. The special train was carrying a Kentucky regiment to Fort Benjamin Harrison to the army maneuvers.

DETECTIVES PUZZLED ALBERT KING DROWNED

Have Been Unable to Locate the Gold Taken From a Shipment From Alaska to Seattle.

(Herald Special.) Seattle, Wash., Sept. 12.—Detectives working on the case report today that they have found no clue to the whereabouts of the \$57,500 in gold bullion stolen from the steamer Humboldt between Fairbanks and Seattle. The theft was discovered last night when three strong boxes were opened, one of which contained pig iron which had been substituted for bullion. The gold was consigned by the Washington Alaska Bank of Fairbanks to the Dexter Horton National of Seattle.

MADAM CAVALIERI IS ANGRY.
Is Coming to America to Contest For Her Pre-Nuptial Rights.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 12.—Albert W. King, a wealthy contracting engineer and well known sportsman, was drowned in Lake Michigan early today. Accompanied by his son and W. H. Newton, King was returning in his yacht from a clam bake at the South Shore Country Club. King was standing on the deck of the yacht when a sudden squall caused the craft to lurch and he was thrown overboard, and was drowned before assistance could reach him.

American Engineer Has Arrived In Havana to Investigate Practicability of Raising the Ship.

Havana, Sept. 11.—J. F. O'Rourke, president of the O'Rourke Engineering and Construction Company of New York arrived here today on the steamer Merida. He will make a survey of the battleship Maine to determine the practicability of his plan for raising the wreck. Mr. O'Rourke conferred this afternoon with Colonel W. M. Black, corps of engineers, U. S. A., who yesterday made a thorough examination of the wreck, taking measurements and sounding. A joint examination of the hull will be made tomorrow.

FOLK WILL BE OPPOSED

BY THE OLD GUARD OF MISSOURI IN EFFORT TO KEEP HIM FROM THE POLITICAL ARENA AGAIN.

(Herald Special.) Jefferson City, Mo., Sept. 12.—An indorsement of former Governor Joseph W. Folk for the presidency in the democratic platform convention here tomorrow will be sharply opposed by the "old guard," who will try to prevent the platform issues from being overshadowed. The fall campaign platforms will be adopted by the democrats, republicans, prohibitionists and socialists.

ROBBERS GET AWAY WITH \$57,500
In Gold—Bullion Was Stolen From a Steamer While in Transit.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 11.—Gold bullion valued at \$57,500, part of a consignment of \$175,000 from the Washington-Alaska Bank of Fairbanks to the Dexter Horton National Bank of Seattle, on the steamship Humboldt, was stolen in transit. Lead was substituted in the strong box that contained it.

Discovery of the theft was announced today. The stolen gold weighed 250 pounds. When it left Fairbanks on a Yukon river steamer for Dawson and White Horse the gold was contained in three wooden boxes and was in the care of the Alaska-Pacific Express company. When the boxes were opened by the Canadian customs officers at Dawson the gold bars were found to be as stated in the express company's papers.

The boxes were opened again at the United States assay office in Seattle Friday noon and the theft was discovered. The seals of the boxes were intact when they reached the assay office and it was evident that the robbery had been committed on board ship. The gold was insured against loss by the express company.

MAY FORCE ACQUITTAL

Because an Analysis of Decomposed Body Could Not Be Made Strengthens Defense.

(Herald Special.) London, Sept. 12.—Because the undertaker and the morgue taker were compelled to use enormous quantities of carbolic acid to counteract the odors of the decomposed body found in the Crippen home, Dr. Crippen's acquittal may be forced when the hearing is resumed today. The defense has revealed an attempt to impeach the expert testimony that satisfactory analysis could have taken place and to show that the carbolic ruined the body for the purpose of analysis.

Mrs. Griffis Killed.
Jacksonville, Fla., Sept. 11.—Mrs. Arthur Griffis was killed, Mrs. Nettie Fernandez was seriously wounded and a young man named Calhoun suffered painful injuries as a result of an automobile accident here today. While going at an excessive speed the car skidded on a sharp curve and dashed into a tree, throwing the occupants violently to the ground. Mrs. Griffis' neck was broken.
