PACKERS ARRESTED

FEDERAL JUDGE LANDIS TODAY ISSUED MITTIMUSSES FOR ARREST OF TEN LEADING PACKERS OF THE COUNTRY.

(Herald Special.)
Chicago, Ill., Sept. 13.—Federal Judge Landis today issued mittimus for the arrest of ten of the leading packers of the country, being the heads of the companies which are organized under the National Packing company with the alleged purpose of controlling the prices of meats. The men are confronted with possible jail sentences. The indictments were returned late yesterday. The service of warrants will not, it is believed, be necessary, as the packers will appear in court today. The bail will probably be fixed at ten thousand dollars each. Attorneys John Smiler and Levy Mayer, representing the packers, appeared in court today and asked Judge Landis to fix the bonds, but not to serve the warrants for arrest on the indicted packers. The court fixed the bonds at one thousand dollars in each indictment, making thirty thousand dollars for each defendant. The attorneys agreed to this arrangement.

AUGUST LOOK SHOT.

Zionsville Man Victim of an Attempted Assassination.

Brenham, Texas, Sept. 12.—Mr. August Look came very near being assassinated Sunday night at 9 o'clock at his home near Zionsville. Some unknown person fired a load of buckshot through the window, but fortunately the load of shot hit his chair and was partly deflected, but four buckshot struck Mr. Look in the neck. His wife, who was sitting nearby, received one bullet in her thigh. Mr. Look was carried to Galveston to a hospital to have the shot removed. There is no clue as to who perpetrated the deed.

THE ARIZONA DEMOCRATS

WILL WRITE THE INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM INTO THE STATE CONSTITUTION — THEY WON OUT TODAY.

Phoenix, Ariz., Sept. 13.—The initiative and referendum will be written in the Arizona constitution. This was assured today by the victory at the polls of the democratic candidates for delegates to the constitutional convention. It is practically certain that twenty-nine out of the fifty-two delegates are democrats and are pledged to the initiative plank. The democrats assert that today's victory is Arizona's answer to the attempted dictation from Washington for a safe and sane constitution.

Withholds Permits.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 12.—The controller has not yet issued liquor permits to persons desiring them in Amarillo, and may not do so. While Amarillo went wet in a local option election held some time ago, the controller is investigating to determine whether or not permits shall be issued. H. H. Cooper, representing certain applicants for permits, was here today and was informed that he might get a decision tomorrow. It seems that the controller is looking into the Amarillo situation to see just what it is before he acts upon the permits. He foresees a possible contest as to the outcome of the recent election in which the antis carried Amarillo, and is probably waiting to see what this will develop. He is also looking into the local option election held at Amarillo two years ago, won by the pros and contested by the antis.

Shade Tree Census.

Washington, Sept. 12.—Washington's annual census of public shade trees shows the total number to be 97,954. During the year 4630 new trees were planted and 2152 standing trees were removed because of disease or building operations, leaving the year's net gain 1878. The cost of planting new trees and keeping in first-class condition this forest of nearly 100,000 trees along the streets and in the parks was \$41,661. There were nine convictions for damaging or removing trees, one man being fined \$75 for removing a tree on the curb line without sanction of the park board. Of the 4630 new trees planted, 1700 were Norway maple, 793 elms, 596 oak and 570 sycamore. The annual Washington tree census has come to be one of the interesting yearly contributions to the literature of civic improvement in this country.

SHOCKED BEVERLY

PRESIDENT TAFT AND THE REPUBLICAN LEADERS ARE NOT REJOICING OVER THE RESULTS OF MAINE ELECTION.

Beverly, Mass., Sept. 13.—There was no statement for publication given out at the summer capital today. The results in Maine were a decided shock, and little effort has been made to conceal this fact. The result is a double sting to the president, as the republican leaders had predicted beneficial effects from the recent visit of the chief executive.

Democrats Victorious.

Portland, Me., Sept. 13.—Early returns today indicate that the entire democratic state ticket has been elected. Three of four congressmen are democrats, with four other districts in doubt. The legislature is safely democratic on joint ballot, insuring democratic United States senators.

Democratic Claims.

Portland, Maine, Sept. 13.—Governor-elect Plaisted today at noon claimed his official plurality would exceed nine thousand. Asher Hinds, Cannon's parliamentarian, claims a plurality of from one to two hundred in the First district. William Fennell, democrat, has probably defeated Hinds. In the Fourth district George Hanson, democrat, will beat Congressman Guernsey. It is probable a recount will be necessary to decide the winner.

POINDEXTER SANGUINE

Arch Insurgent of the Northwest is Confident of Nomination to the United States Senate.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 13.—The friends of Congressman Miles Poin Dexter, the arch insurgent of the northwest, are confident that he will be nominated for United States senator in today's primary, following the hardest fought campaign in the history of Washington. Besides nominating a candidate for senator the two parties will nominate their congressmen, members of the legislature and county tickets.

CONDITION IS CRITICAL

R. O. MARSH, SECRETARY OF THE AMERICAN LEGATION IN PANAMA, RECALLED TODAY AND T. DAWSON WILL TAKE CONTROL.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 13.—The critical condition in Panama about which the state department is maintaining the utmost secrecy, culminated today in the recall of R. O. Marsh, secretary of the American legation and acting charge d' affaires. Simultaneously it was announced that Thomas Dawson, minister to Panama, will proceed from Washington tomorrow to assume charge of the situation.

THE FRIENDS OF FRANCIS GREATEST CONVENTION

Received a Jar This Afternoon When the Missouri Democratic Convention Voted.

Jefferson City, Mo., Sept. 13.—The supporters of David R. Francis, senatorial candidate, received a setback this afternoon when Joseph Shannon of Kansas City, and a supporter of James A. Read, also a candidate for the senate, was elected chairman of the democratic state committee. The republican convention selected Chas. D. Morris as chairman of their state committee.

Houston Opens Campaign.

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 12.—Colonel A. J. Houston, the prohibition party nominee for governor of Texas, will open his campaign Thursday night at Alvin. P. P. Paige, state secretary, states that other speakers will be in the field and that a vigorous campaign will be prosecuted by the prohibitionists. Mr. Paige said that Colonel Houston would deliver in Dallas on Wednesday five speeches. His itinerary will be announced later.

Held West of the Mississippi River During Present Year Will Take Place in San Antonio.

San Antonio, Texas, Sept. 13.—Acceptance from six governors to attend the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress in San Antonio November 22-25 have been received. Kansas, Colorado, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas will be so represented. Secretary of State Knox, Wm. J. Bryan, Gifford Pinchot, John W. Noble and John Barrett of the Bureau of American Republics will be among the visitors present. In addition some twenty-five or thirty diplomats from South America have accepted invitations, also a number of governors from Mexican states. This will be the greatest convention held west of the Mississippi river during the current year.
