## COLLEGE SINGING GIRLS

Made a Big Hit in Galveston Monday Night—At the Temple Theatre Friday Night.

With a company of eight attractive members, all of whom possessed voices above the average, with a collection of costumes both dainty and vivid, Walter Eccles presented his "College Singing Girls" at the Grand Opera House Monday evening. It was the first appearance of the company in Galveston, and they were greeted by a fair audience, the orchestra seats being well filled by the members of the Independent Order of Beavers, under whose auspices the company played its Galveston engagement.

The program for the evening consisted of seventeen vocal numbers, solos and choruses following one another in quick succession. It was a well-chosen selection of numbers, the average running high. There were none of the members of the company but whose voices were sweet, and clear-toned, and their renditions of many of the songs were received by the audience with hearty applause. The best solo of the evening was Frances Conn's song, "My Little Gypsy Sweetheart," which showed the fine range of her voice, and which was well staged. The most attractive number, for general balance and charm, was the sixth, in which four of the girls, costumed in the soft silks and powdered hair of the days of Monsieur Beaucaire, sang "Sweet Genevieve," and followed this song with "The Minuet," a number which ended in a presentation of the courtly old dance itself, the orchestra playing an old English air that fitted perfectly the slow and stately steps.

There was a hearty burst of applause at the conclusion of the best comedy number of the evening, "Dat's in der Deutsche School," in which Eccles, costumed as a German vaudeville, Weber & Fields sort of school-master, listened to the recitations in verse of a class of four buxom "Deutsche Madchen." Anita Kemp-ton's Dutch character song was well received by the audience, among which she seemed to have many friends, and the song by a quartette of young ladies, "When a Girl Knows a Secret," was one of the best costumed of the numbers presented.

But by far the best of the musical part of the program came toward the end, when three songs were given, one the song of Tittiana, from "Mignon;" one the spinning song, from "Martha," and the third the Tyrolean chorals, from "William Tell." This last was doubtless the best of the songs rendered during the evening, both in point of technique and the pleasing manner in which the voices of the singers harmonized. It was well received by the audience, as was, for that matter, practically every number given. There were calls for an encore at nearly every selection, to which the company generously responded.

At the conclusion of the performance there was a little fete at the rear of the stage, in which, when the audience left the house, the employees gave the company a "spread," upon the menu of which ice cream and cake played a prominent part.—Galveston News.

Henne, H. Stein and J. R. Fuchs, all of New Braunfels, a little German town about thirty miles from San Antonio. The league proposes to extend its membership over the entire union and curtail the operations of the highwayman in white aprons and those dusky bandits who wield whisk brooms on Pullman sleepers.

### WILL SELL OLD FORT.

Fort Davis in Jeff Davis County Gives Way to Progress.

San Antonio, Texas, Sept. 21.—Fort Davis in Jeff Davis county, Texas, one of the famous strongholds in Indian days, will be sold on November 21. The fort was abandoned by the war department in 1906 and turned over to the interior department. The tract of three hundred acres will be sold in lots of thirty acres each. For several years it has been used as a summer resort, as the altitude is nearly 5000 feet and the climate delightful.

### War on High Prices.

Chicago, Sept. 20.—The outcry against the high cost of living has affected Evanston, and the result will be the establishment of a co-operative store by one hundred and seventy residents of the North Shore suburb, designed to eliminate the profit of the middleman or retailer. The originators of the project say the management of the store will be vested in a board of directors. Purchasers will pay the market price for commodities and at the end of each month or quarter, profits will be equally distributed in the shape of "rebates" to the stockholders.

## CANDIDATES AND ISSUES

In Oregon Are Set Forth in Dispatch From Salem—Primaries Will Be Held Saturday.

### (Herald Special.)

Salem, Ore., Sept. 22.—Following a spirited campaign that has been kept up all summer, statewide primaries will be held throughout Oregon day after tomorrow to determine who are to be the candidates of the republicans and democrats for the offices to be filled at the November election. The contest for the gubernatorial nomination has been interesting on both sides, and the congressional contests on the republican ticket have echoed the national insurgent movement.

The old-line republicans in July held an "assembly" and suggested candidates for all state offices for the guidance of the party voters. This move was opposed by a large and influential element of the party and as a result three candidates entered against Jay Bowerman, assembly candidate for governor. They were E. Hofer, a Salem newspaper man, who advocates the direct primary law as it stands and opposes the prohibition amendment for the state constitution; Grant B. Dimick of Oregon City, who declares in favor of the primary law and strict economy in public affairs, and Albert Abraham of Roseburg, who advocates the Hughes-Taft-Roosevelt plan of primary law as a model for Oregon amendments. With this division of the "anti-assembly" forces, it is believed that Bowerman stands the best chance of securing the republican nomination.

On the democratic side, Jefferson Myers, a democratic war horse of Portland, and Oswald West, who as a member of the state railroad commission secured many concessions for the people of Oregon, seek the gubernatorial nomination, with the chances of success apparently somewhat in favor of West.

With Bowerman likely to get the republican nomination and West the democratic, the indications seem to point to another democratic governor for republican Oregon, for it is believed that the "anti-assembly" republicans are almost certain to support the democratic nominee in preference to Bowerman. United States Senator Bourne, national champion of the "Oregon plan," which includes the initiative and referendum and popular vote for United States senator, has intimated that he would vote for a democrat rather than an assembly candidate, and his attitude in the matter is believed to reflect the prevailing sentiment among the anti-assembly republicans.

Oregon's two representatives in congress, Willis C. Hawley of the First district and William R. Ellis of the Second, are seeking renomination and election on the republican ticket. Hawley has side-stepped the Cannon issue, and Ellis has likewise avoided its discussion. Both representatives received the indorsement of the assembly, and both are opposed by anti-assembly candidates who are avowed insurgents. B. F. Mulkey is the opponent of Hawley, while George M. Shepherd, C. J. Reed and A. W. Laferty are seeking the republican nomination for Ellis's seat.

In addition to governor and congressmen the primaries on Saturday will determine the candidates for secretary of state, state treasurer, justices of the supreme court, attorney general, superintendent of public instruction, state printer, circuit court judges and numerous minor state officers. Candidates for both branches of the legislature will also be named, but as no United States senatorship is involved the legislative contests are not attracting a great deal of attention.

With all the opposition to the assembly plan, there are half a dozen aspirants for places on the state ticket who are not opposed by anti-assembly candidates, and perhaps a score of state senators and representatives have no opposition.

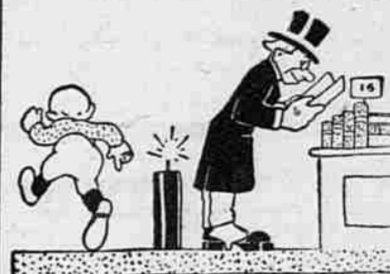
