## FELL INTO A CREEK

ROCK ISLAND PASSENGER TRAIN FELL THROUGH A BRIDGE AND EIGHT PERSONS WERE KILLED. FOUR BODIES RECOVERED.

(Herald Special.) Norton, Kas., Sept. 23.—Eight persons were killed and several injured today when a Rock Island passenger train, from St. Louis to Denver plunged through a forty foot trestle into a creek west of Slayton, Kansas. Four bodies have been recovered, and the other four are visible at the bottom of the creek under the wreckage.

## CROSSED THE ALPS

SUCCESSING IN THIS FEAT GEO. CHAVEZ, AVIATOR, LOST CONTROL OF MACHINE, FELL AND WAS FATALLY INJURED.

(Herald Special.) Brieg, Switzerland, Sept. 23.—After a successful flight over the Alps and Simplon Pass, seven thousand feet high, today, George Chavez, the Peruvian aviator, was dangerously injured in a fall near Domodos Solo, thirty miles from Brieg. Chavez lost control of his machine through the numbing of his hands because of the extreme coldness when flying almost nine thousand feet high. The monoplane dashed toward the earth at terrific speed. When within two hundred feet of the ground the aviator regained sufficient control to check descent and prevent the violent landing threatened. However, the fall was sufficient to break Chavez's left leg and right thigh, and he sustained other injuries that may prove fatal.

## MR. COULTER WILL SPEAK

At the Banquet Tonight, Bringing to a Close the Y. M. C. A. Employed Officers' Conference.

The two days' session of the Employed Officers' Conference of the Y. M. C. A. of Texas will be brought to a close tonight with a banquet, at which Judge John M. King will preside and the farewell address will be delivered by State Secretary L. A. Coulter of Dallas.

Two sessions were held today. The morning session opened with devotional services, conducted by L. M. Ward of Sherman. C. D. Morgan of Dallas told of the international swimming campaign. J. V. Baird of Mart told the conference how the association can best serve the young men in the rural districts. He was followed by Kirby Page of Houston, who spoke on "The Best Methods of Reaching the Stranger in the City." The meeting then recessed and upon reconvening a general discussion of perplexing problems was entered into.

A short business meeting was held at the afternoon session, and then followed the departmental conference, the speakers and subjects being as follows: "City Secretaries," S. J. Briant, Beaumont; "Physical Directors," Dr. H. E. Hoke, Waco; "Railroad Secretaries," S. L. Clarke, Cleburne.

## INDORSE PRESIDENT

ILLINOIS REPUBLICANS WANT A PERMANENT TARIFF COMMISSION AND MODIFIED STATE RAILROAD LAWS.

(Herald Special.) Springfield, Ill., Sept. 23.—The republican state convention today adopted a platform commending the Taft administration and favoring the creation of a permanent tariff commission. Also favors moderation of the state railroad laws and constitutional abolition of the minority representative system. Governor Deneen was made temporary and then permanent chairman, with the Deneen faction in full control of the convention. Senator Lorimer was not mentioned in the deliberations.

## SAN ANTONIO IS LEADING

The Cities of Texas as to Population, Having 96,614—Fort Worth's Remarkable Growth.

Washington, Sept. 22.—The census bureau tonight announced the population of San Antonio as 96,614, as compared with 53,321 in 1900, an increase of 43,293, or 81.2 per cent. The population of Fort Worth was also announced. It shows 73,312, as compared with 26,688 in 1900, a gain of 46,624, or 174.7 per cent.

The population of Galveston is announced at 36,981, as compared with 37,789, a decrease of 808, or 2.1 per cent. These figures, in connection with those of Dallas and Houston, are forward strides that Texas has made in the past ten years have been normally distributed between the larger cities and the rural districts, as is shown by the returns from the fifty-three counties whose census has been announced heretofore.

Three interesting things are made clear by tonight's figures: One is that Galveston has practically overcome the disastrous setback it received in the height of its prosperity in 1900, having today a population within 808 of its top notch figures. Another thing shown is that while San Antonio, with its area of thirty-six square miles, has 96,614 inhabitants, the greatest actual growth in ten years was made by Dallas, which added 49,666 inhabitants on its eighteen and a half square miles. Next to Dallas, Fort Worth made the greatest actual gain, having increased its population in ten years by 46,624. Then comes San Antonio with an actual increase of 43,293; and then comes Houston with 34,167 gain.

## POLITICAL LEADER DEAD.

General Chas. Brayon Dies Suddenly at Providence, R. I.

(Herald Special.) Providence, R. I., Sept. 23.—General Charles Brayon, the blind republican dictator of Rhode Island, died suddenly at his home here early today. A fracture of a leg a few weeks ago hastened his death through complications.

## Twenty-Five Cent Cotton.

Clarksville, Texas, Sept. 22.—Long staple cotton sold here today as high as 25c a pound. Up to date 2500 bales have been weighed in here this fall and A. M. Grant, public weigher, estimates the crop that will be marketed here at 12,000 bales, 2000 more than was received here last year. This amount of cotton at prices now prevailing is going to put more money in circulation in this county than for ten years.

## Planing Mill Burned.

Pittsburg, Texas, Sept. 22.—Fire this evening destroyed the plan of the Reynolds Brothers Planing Mill company and a large quantity of lumber, entailing a loss estimated at \$20,000. The Katy depot was damaged, but was saved by hard work of the fire fighters.

## Spiritualists at Fort Worth.

Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 22.—The advance guard of the Texas spiritualists arrived in Fort Worth Thursday and will attend the opening session of the state convention tomorrow.

## A BIG GUN EXPLODED

ABOARD THE UNITED STATES BATTLESHIP GEORGIA, STUNNING FOURTEEN MEMBERS OF THE CREW—SHIP SHAKEN.

(Herald Special.) Aboard U. S. S. Georgia, Southern Drill Grounds (Wireless via Portsmouth, Va.), Sept. 23.—Fourteen members of the crew of the forward turret were severely stunned today by the explosion of the muzzle of one of the great ten-inch guns on the left side of the turret. The turret was fired as the first shot in today's battle practice. Great excitement followed the explosion, and the ship was shaken clear to the engine room. None of those shocked are seriously injured.

## WANT NO POSTPONEMENT

Senatorial Committee Investigating Lorimer Case Declined to Permit Postponement.

(Herald Special.) Chicago, Ill., Sept. 23.—The senatorial committee investigating the election of Senator Lorimer today overruled the motion made by Lorimer's counsel for a postponement of the inquiry until after the November elections. The committee decided that the investigation should start right now. The Chicago Tribune's request that its counsel be allowed to be present at the hearing was granted. The committee requested counsel to agree upon a procedure to expedite the investigation, then adjourned until Monday.

## TURNED TURTLE

AUTO GOING SIXTY-FIVE MILES AN HOUR TURNED OVER AND SERIOUSLY INJURED DRIVER GEORGE ROBERTSON.

(Herald Special.) Mineola, L. I., Sept. 23.—Speeding at sixty-five miles an hour, George Robertson, the well known racing driver, lost control of his Benz car on the Motor Parkway here this morning and was seriously hurt. He was hurried to the Mineola hospital and fractured collar bone, a broken arm, and a probable fracture of the skull, as well as internal injuries. Stephen Arnolds, riding with Robertson, was less seriously injured. The brakes failed to work and the car overturned where the parkway merges into the dirt roadway. The car struck a post and the drivers were hurled through a fence. The men were training for the Vanderbilt events.

## COL. PAYNE IS DEFIANT

Says the Payne-Aldrich Tariff Fulfills the Republican Party Pledges. Was Renominated Today.

(Herald Special.) Lyons, N. Y., Sept. 23.—That the Payne-Aldrich tariff fulfills the pledges of the last republican platform and is an excellent law with the possible exception of the wool schedule is the defiant contention of Sen. B. Payne, one of the authors of the bill, in a speech here today. For the fourteenth time Payne was today renominated by the republicans of the Thirty-first New York district.
