BOY CORN GROWERS

OPPORTUNITY OFFERED FOR ANDERSON COUNTY BOYS TO PICK UP EASY MONEY AT THE TEXAS STATE FAIR.

United States Department of Agriculture. Bureau of Plant Industry.

The subject of this great move on part of the United States Department of Agriculture is to encourage the production of more and better corn throughout the state of Texas by careful, systematic farming, and better methods of cultivation and better implements. The increase on an average of ten bushels per acre to the present corn crop of Texas would mean seventy-five million dollars annually to the state of Texas, and to assist in this worthy move the State Fair of Texas offers the following premiums, aggregating in total about twelve hundred dollars, to be awarded under the following rules:

First. All boys must be under 20 years of age, and members of the regular corn club in the demonstration work.

Second. Each boy must plant his own crop and do his own work.

Third. Exhibits must be delivered to the Secretary of the State Fair of Texas by October 15, 1910, and must consist of ten ears each.

Fourth. Each boy must submit affidavit attested by two disinterested citizens showing the amount of yield per acre and the method of measurement.

Fifth. The basis of award for the State Fair Sweepstakes and the Bankers' Association prizes shall be as follows: (a) Greatest yield per acre, 30 per cent; (b) Best ten ear exhibit, 20 per cent; (c) Best written record showing history of crop, 20 per cent; (d) Best showing of profit in business statement, 30 per cent. Note: In estimating profits uniform prices must be used as follows: \$4.00 per acre for rent; 10c per hour for work for each boy; 5c per hour for each horse; \$2.00 per two-horse load for stable manure and actual cost of commercial fertilizing.

Ninth. Items (a) and (b) will be judged and graded by a sub-committee consisting of agricultural experts. Items (c) and (d) will be judged by a sub-committee of educational experts.

Seventh. All contestants for prizes shall first submit corn to county committee, consisting of the county judge, county school superintendent, and third person to be selected by the two named, the result of which shall thereafter be transmitted and submitted to the state judge as hereinabove stated. All county contests shall be governed by the rules hereinabove stated. The sub-committee shall report to the central committee of the State Fair, who average the returns and make the awards, together with the committee appointed by the Texas Bankers' Association.

Weather Conditions.

The western storm is moving south-eastward, attended by rain in the North Pacific states, the Plateau region, the Plains states, the Mississippi valley and the lake region. This disturbance has also caused warmer weather on the east slope of the Rockies. There has been a decided fall in temperature from northern Minnesota to northwestern Texas. General rains have fallen in the gulf states. The eastern high pressure area has remained almost stationary during the past 24 hours and the weather continues generally fair in that section. The following heavy precipitation in inches has been reported during the past 24 hours: Chicago, 1.00; San Antonio, 1.16; Taylor, 1.02. Partly cloudy weather is indicated for this vicinity tonight and Wednesday.
