Arrested at Orange.

Orange, Texas, Oct. 19.—Bob Goodman was arrested in Orange last night at the request of Newton county peace officers on a charge of highway robbery. A wholesale robbery is alleged to have been committed near Deweyville, about eighteen miles from Orange, in the edge of Newton county, the latter part of last week. There were said to be about five young men implicated in the robbery, when a crowd of men were held up at the point of revolvers and robber of all their cash as well as several bottles of whisky. The young man was placed in the Orange county prison last night and was taken in custody by a Newton county deputy sheriff this morning, who left with him for Newton.

Missing Steamers Come In.

New Orleans, La., Oct. 19.—Encountering rough passage and delayed many hours by the hurricane which swept the gulf waters during the past few days, five steamers for the safety of which much concern had been felt, reached New Orleans tonight. They are the Turrialba and Mount Vernon of the United Fruit company; the Mercator of the Jos. Vacarro company and the Marietta di Giorgio of the Bluefield Steamship company. 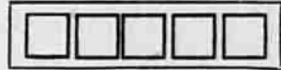
