Weather Conditions.

An area of low pressure extends across the northern portion of the country from Montana to New England, with cyclonic centers over North Dakota, Michigan and eastern Maine. An area of low pressure of slight intensity overlies southern California. No rain of consequence has fallen during the past 24 hours except light showers in Maine and Oregon. A ridge of high pressure extends from the North Pacific states southeastward to Texas. Light frost is reported in Kentucky and heavy frost in Pennsylvania. Barometric conditions indicate generally fair weather for this vicinity tonight and Tuesday.

SPARE THE ROD AND SAVE THE CHILD.

Corporal Health and Not Corporal Punishment the Keynote in Modern School Methods.

Mrs. Ella F. Young, Superintendent of the Chicago Schools and President of the National Educational Association, says that the development of the child physically, morally and mentally is best secured by developing the good in him and not by punishment corporal or otherwise.

Years ago, the backward child—the one who seemed stupid and restless, and unable to learn—received a dose of the rod. NOTICE.

State of Texas, County of Anderson.

Whereas, on the 10th day of August, 1910, the county commissioners' court made and entered of record in Vol. 16, page 510, of the commissioners' court minutes, an order for an election to be held to determine whether or not a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of said county desire that there shall be annually levied upon the property within said county by said commissioners' court, a tax of 16c on the One Hundred Dollars' worth of property for road purposes under the provisions of an amendment to the state constitution adopted in 1890.

Now, therefore, I, O. C. Funderburk, County Judge of said county, in pursuance of said order and by authority vested in me by Article 4787 of the revised statutes of Texas, do hereby give notice that said election shall be held in the several voting precincts of the county on the 8th day of November, 1910—the day of the general election; that said election shall be held and returns made by the officers holding said general election; that only qualified voters who are also property tax-payers of this county shall be permitted to vote at said election; that said election officers shall procure a separate ballot box for said election and shall be furnished separate poll and tally lists and separate returns and envelopes for said election, and shall hold and conduct said election according to the general laws governing the holding of elections. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed on them the words "For the Tax and 'Against the Tax," and those who favor the tax shall vote the ticket "For the Tax," and those who oppose the tax shall vote the ticket "Against the tax."
