LIVING TORCH MANY KILLED

WOMAN BURNED IN PRESENCE OF HUNDREDS IN NEW YORK CAFE AT MIDNIGHT.

CONDITION IS SERIOUS

Her Clothing Was Ignited From Curtains—Many Other Women Fainted at the Sight of the Burning Woman.

New York, Jan. 1.—Mrs. Charles Ellis, who was burned in sight of hundreds of other people in the Cafe Martin last night just after the whistles had announced the birth of the new year, is in a hospital now under the influence of powerful opiates to relieve the terrible agony she suffered. It is believed that the woman will die. Mrs. Ellis was on the balcony of the great cafe when the lights, according to a new year custom, were turned out. A curtain near her caught fire and in some way her clothing was ignited, and she ran across the balcony, a pillar of fire. She was in plain view of the hundreds of revelers on the streets, and many women who witnessed the sight fainted.

EARTHQUAKE RECORDED

Government Officials at Washington Fear Serious Damage Has Been Done—Other Reports.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 1.—The seismograph in the weather bureau today indicated an earthquake of considerable magnitude. It is believed that serious damage has been done somewhere.

Seismograph Disturbed.

Cleveland, O., Jan. 1.—Fabor Odenbach's seismograph today recorded the most severe vibrations within his recollection. It is estimated that the disturbance occurred three thousand miles away. The shocks recurred between 5 and 6 o'clock this morning.

Albany Reports It.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 1.—The seismograph in the State Museum recorded an earthquake today. The oscillation continued for over two hours. The officials of the museum believe the disturbance occurred somewhere in Mexico.

AFTER ESTRADA'S LIFE

Plot Said to Exist Whereby Hired Assassins Will Undertake Assassination of Revolutionist.

New Orleans, La., Jan. 1.—Counsel for Estrada here today declared he had received information that a plot to take Estrada's life had been formed. The information says that four assassins have been hired to kill Estrada, and it is claimed that the agents of the deposed President Zelaya are behind the plot. The representative here refused to divulge the source of his information, but declared that the Zelaya following had decided the only way to crush the revolution was to take the life of Estrada, and so the plot was formed.

ANARCHISTS ARRESTED

Believed Prompt Action Prevented an Attempt to Assassinate King Alfonso of Spain.

San Luis, Spain, Jan. 1.—The police are convinced that the arrest here last night of three Germans, two Frenchmen and two Italians prevented the carrying out of the attempt of a plot to assassinate King Alfonso. The suspects are anarchists. The king passed through here yesterday on his way to Granada.

TWIN DECKS OF TRAMP STEAMER COLLAPSED AND KILLED MANY OF THE CREW.

FOUR BODIES RECOVERED

Many Others Can Be Seen, But the Exact Number of Dead Will Not Be Known Until the Hull is Cleared.

Baltimore, Md., Jan. 1.—The twin decks of the tramp steamer Luckenbach, lying at anchor off the Lower Capton, in Baltimore harbor, collapsed today, burying many men. Four bodies have been taken out of the hold so far, and many others can be seen, but the exact number of dead will not be known until the hull is cleaned out late today. It is known that many are injured. The cause of the accident has not been learned.

THEY MAY HAVE A CLUE

Los Angeles Police Believe They May Be Able to Locate Dorothy Taft, Kidnaped.

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 1.—New year brought to the police here a clue that may lead to the finding of Dorothy Taft, aged twelve years, and a distant relative of President Taft. Officers believe the little girl has been kidnaped with a view to making the president offer a reward or pay a ransom for her. The girl is the adopted daughter of Rev. S. H. Taft, a distant cousin of the president. She appeared white on a train, and all effort so far to locate her has failed. The clue that reached the police today says the girl is concealed in a frame house near the city, and detectives have gone to the scene to make a search.

WILL MEET OPPOSITION

The Appeal of Morse Will Be Strongly Contested—He Knows His Only Chance Is Clemency.

New York, Jan. 1.—The appeal of Charles W. Morse, the convicted banker, for an appeal, will meet with bitter opposition. Morse and his friends admit that he is doomed to prison unless he can get executive clemency. It is believed the petition will soon be filed with President Taft. Financiers of Wall street, who hold Morse partly responsible for the recent panic, will fight the move to have him pardoned.

WILL CONFER MONDAY.

Perham and Commissioner Knapp to Discuss Strike Situation.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 1.—The conference between Delegate Perham of the railway department of the American Federation of Labor and Interstate Commerce Commissioner Knapp, scheduled for today, has been deferred until Monday, when an effort will be made to formulate a basis of settlement of the switchmen's strike in the northwest. Perham said today that so far the situation only indicated a further spread of the strike.

Armies on the Move.

Managua, Nic., Jan. 1.—General Toledo and General Vasquez have been ordered with their armies to the front. It is said that General Toledo will go to Greytown, where an attack upon the government troops will probably be made. Vasquez will go to Acopya, where a battle is expected within the next few days.

Davidson Pays Over \$170,000.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 31.—As a final act of his administration, Attorney General Davidson, who retires this evening, today paid into the state treasury the sum of \$170,000, which represents collections from the Security Oil company of Beaumont, the Union Tank Line company and the Standard Oil of Indiana and the Navarro Refining company.
