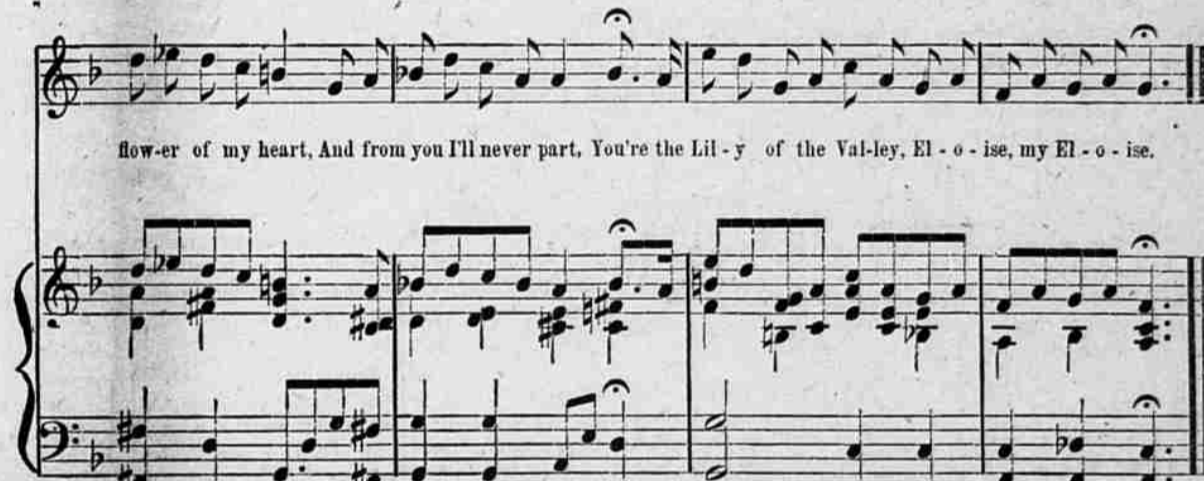

Evangelist Layfield Preached Last Sermon at Congregational Church Sunday Night.

Evangelist Layfield preached to extra large sized audiences three times yesterday at the Congregational church, and every service that he has held in Palestine was a little better and more helpful to all classes of people. At the morning service yesterday one young man and three children publicly confessed Christ. In the afternoon service the church was well filled with women, and one woman publicly confessed the Savior. At the evening service the evangelist made a most touching appeal, and several men and women stood, expressing a desire to be saved. One boy went forward to make a public confession of Christ.

In all the meetings there were fifty-five confessions. The evangelist's heart to heart preaching did not suit all of the mem-

bers of the church, but it was blessed of God to all who were prepared to receive truths from God's word, which make outspoken christians in season and out of season, and make them willing to sacrifice all for the salvation of those who are not yet saved, by being made all things unto all men, women and children, that by all means they might win some of them to Christ.

The evangelist will begin a meeting next Wednesday night at Dallas, in the Bethany Presbyterian church, and then, if he can be kept longer in Texas, he will likely hold another meeting there at the First Congregational church.

His message is always clear and simple, and profusely illustrated, so that every person who hears him speak understands his preaching. Indeed, it is proven by the sermons he has delivered in Palestine that it takes a great man to be a simple man, and like Mr. Moody of old, to win all classes of people to trust the Lord Jesus Christ as a personal Savior and learn to love Him and to serve Him. TODAY'S NEWS IN BRIEF

Items of Interest Gathered From Over the World For the Benefit of Herald Readers.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 10.—The biennial convention of the Bricklayers and Stonemasons International Union opened in Faneuil Hall today. The initial session was devoted to the exchange of greetings, appointment of committees and the officers' annual reports.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Jan. 10.—The treatment and prevention of tuberculosis is to be the chief subject of discussion at a big meeting begun here today by the Oklahoma Medical Association. Many eminent physicians and surgeons are scheduled for addresses during the two days' session.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 10.—The suit of the government against former Captain Oberlin M. Carter was on the docket of the United States supreme court today for argument. The suit was brought by the government in an effort to gain possession of the money held by Carter at the time of his arrest for defalcation in connection with the Savannah harbor improvements.

Paris, Jan. 10.—Countess Cassini, who was a popular figure in Washington society when her uncle, Count Cassini, was Russian ambassador there, has arranged to make her professional debut tomorrow night in Salle Femina, one of the most fashionable concert halls in Paris. Later in the season the countess expects to make her appearance at the opera.

New York, Jan. 10.—A large party of racing officials and turfmen left today for Detroit to attend the meeting of the board of stewards of the Grand Circuit.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 10.—Members of the Northwestern Retail Harness and Saddlery Manufacturers' Association assembled in this city today for their annual meeting.

Caldwell, Idaho, Jan. 10.—A good attendance marked the opening here today of the annual convention of the Idaho Dairywomen's Association. In connection with the meeting several

large displays of machinery used in dairy and creamery work are to be seen.

Youngstown, O., Jan. 10.—The annual tournament of the Ohio State Bowling Association began with a large entry list here today and will continue through the week.

Shawnee, Okla., Jan. 10.—Numerous matters of importance to the bottling trade are to be considered at the meeting of the Oklahoma State Bottlers' Association, which began a three days' session here today.

Pinehurst, N. C., Jan. 10.—Auspicious conditions attended the opening here today of the seventh annual mid-winter golf tournament. Many amateur and professional golfers of note are included among the contestants.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 10.—Representatives of all the textile workers' unions of Massachusetts met in conference here today to agree upon a program of labor legislation to be presented to the legislature now in session.

Topeka, Kas., Jan. 10.—What promises to be the largest and most representative gathering of farmers ever held in Kansas began in this city today with a meeting of the Kansas Improved Live Stock Breeders' Association. Wednesday the state board of agriculture will begin its thirty-ninth annual meeting and during the week there will also be meetings of the swine breeders, corn growers and other state organizations in which the farmers are interested. An attendance of nearly one thousand visitors is expected during the week.
