**BEAT THEIR BRAINS OUT.**

Runnels County Farmer Killed Wife, Son and Daughter.

Ballinger, Texas, Jan. 9.—F. B. Kimbler, a prominent farmer living in the northern part of this county, killed his wife, his 6-year-old son and 3-year-old daughter, seriously wounded his niece, aged 20, and ended his own life by cutting his throat from ear to ear with a pocket knife at daylight this morning.

Kimbler had been in bad health for several months, but got up at the usual time this morning and was assisting his wife to make the fires. He stepped out and returning to the room where his wife was starting the fire with the hatchet in his hand, said: "Wife, we have all got to go," and split his wife's head open with the hatchet. THREE KILLED, ONE INJURED

In Wreck in the Texas & Pacific Yards at Shreveport.

Shreveport, La., Jan. 10.—Three persons killed and one fatally injured is the result of a collision which occurred about 11:30 o'clock last night in the Texas & Pacific freight yards between a Kansas City Southern switch

terric force into the Pullman car attached to the rear of train No. 53, plowing its way for fully half the length of the Pullman. Conductor Cornwall and Miss Evans were standing on the rear platform of the Pullman when the switch engine struck it and were buried beneath the debris. Conductor Cornwall's body was crushed almost beyond recognition, while Miss Evans was pinned underneath the wrecked Pullman and lived almost an hour but was dead when the workmen were able to reach her body.

Switchman Parris was riding on the rear footboard of the switch engine and was knocked off by the crash, the rebound of the engine having caught and crushed him, killing him instantly. John Brandon, the Pullman porter,

was in the rear of his car and was so badly crushed that he will die.

The small number of fatalities is attributed to the small number of passengers in the Pullman.

The dead were removed from the debris by 1 o'clock this morning.

Mrs. Kimbler and the baby lived for five or six hours, but the 6-year-old boy was instantly killed. The young lady is in a serious condition and her recovery is doubtful.

Kimbler had been living in this county for a number of years, was a successful farmer, a county officer in the Farmers' Union, was intelligent, and popular with his neighbors.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 10.—The census report by the government department shows that 9,646,285 bales of cotton of the 1909 crop had been ginned up to January first, as compared with 12,465,298 last year for the same period. The average for the five years before last year was 9,951,500 bales.
