Such was the case today when there was offered at executor's sale a plot of ground in the heart of the financial district which has been owned by the same family for nearly one hundred years. The parcel, which is located at the corner of Cortlandt and Greenwich streets, is sold to wind up the Bedford estate. The first of the Bedford connections with the property, which came through the Van Solingens, a well known physician of his day and related to the Bedford family through marriage, acquired the property from the old Bayard and Varrick families.

INVESTIGATING GRAFT

Charges—New York State Senate Begins Investigation of Charges Against Jotham Allds.

(Herald Special.)

Albany, N. Y., Feb. 8.—Today saw the formal opening of the investigation of the state senate into the charges brought against Jotham P. Allds, majority leader and president pro tem of that body. The investigation, which is expected to last a week or longer, is to be conducted by the senate, sitting as a committee of the whole.

The charges were brought by Senator Ben Conger, who alleges that Allds on April 23, 1901, while a member of the assembly, demanded, received and accepted \$1,000 in consideration for his failure to press a certain bill then pending before the house. Senator Allds has entered a general denial of the charges made against him.


