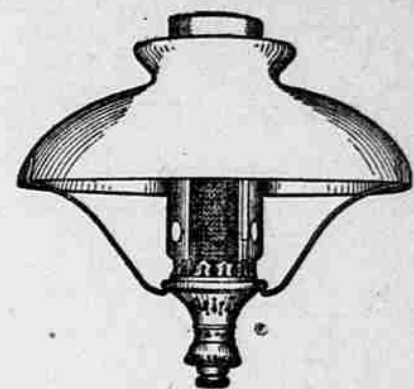

SELECTING THE JURY

In the Durham Case at Hillsboro. Four Men Qualify.

Hillsboro, Texas, Feb. 7.—Both sides have announced ready, and opposing counsel in the case are engaged in the task of securing a jury to try Maj. T. E. Durham, a state official, on the charge that in 1905 he killed a convict called Athens by beating him with a leather strap.

When court adjourned this afternoon at 5:45 o'clock four jurors had been accepted and a special venire of fifty men exhausted. Another special venire of fifty men was ordered, the other being returnable tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock.

The jurors selected are: A. J. Watson, W. J. Conway, W. R. Utley, J. R. (Bud) Wade. All are farmers.

PAPER TRUST CONFESSES

And Pays Fifty-Two Thousand Dollar Fine.

New York, Feb. 7.—Twenty-six manufacturing firms, members of the Paper Board Association, indicted by the federal grand jury in December last as members of an illegal combination in restraint of trade, took the easiest legal issues today and entered a plea of guilty as an association in the United States circuit court. Fines of \$2,000 each, \$52,000 in all, were imposed, and in all except one case

were paid in cash. Thus ends the second organization of paper men formed by John H. Parks.

The fiber and manilla combine met a similar fate in the federal courts some time ago. By pleading guilty as corporations today individuals, also indicted in the Paper Board Association, succeeded in having their indictments quashed.

The association had its headquarters in this city and has been in existence for more than four years.
