BIG MILL BLEW UP TODAY

And Killed Six Workmen Outright and Seriously Injured Many Others, Two Fatally.

(Herald Special.)
Bay City, Mich., Feb. 10.—The Princelings mill at Crump, eighteen miles northwest of this city, blew up today, killing six workmen outright, fatally injuring two and seriously injuring many others.
The explosion occurred just before starting time this morning, and a number of the employes were standing about the boiler room getting warm when the boiler exploded without warning. A number of miraculous escapes are reported. The mill is located just outside of Crump, a village of some one hundred and fifty people. The cause of the explosion is unknown.

WRIGHTS ARE DECORATED

By the Smithsonian Institute For Their Achievements In Aviation. Langley Medals.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 10.—Wilbur and Orville Wright today received the recognition of the Smithsonian Institute for the achievements in science of aviation. The recognition was marked by the presentation to the brothers of the Langley medal, authorized by the regents of the institution. The medal is so named in honor of Samuel W. Langley, late secretary of the institution, who was the pioneer in aeronautics in this country. Chief Justice Fuller of the United States supreme court and chancellor of the institute made the presentation, and was responded to by Wilbur Wright. Following the presentation, Wilbur left for Florida to conduct a series of experiments, and Orville returned to Dayton.

AMERICAN WAS INJURED

Gabriel Bishop, Chief of Artillery in Estrada's Army, Seriously Wounded In Engagement.

Bluefields, via Wireless to Colon, Feb. 10.—Gabriel Bishop, an American, chief of artillery in Estrada's army, was wounded in an engagement near Lake Managua, according to advices received here today. His condition is said to be serious. Bishop is a native of New Iberia, La., and distinguished himself in the battle of Retreou.

DURHAM CASE GOES OVER.

The State Asked a Continuance and It Was Granted.

Hillsboro, Texas, Feb. 9.—After silently reading three log documents submitted to him by counsel interested, Judge W. C. Wea at 9 o'clock tonight slowly swung out in his big arm chair in the district court room and made this announcement regarding the case of the Site of Texas vs. T. E. Durham, assistant superintendent of penitentiaries charged by indictment with having caused the death of a convict by beating him with a strap: "On motion granted, case continued until the March term, 1910." Thereupon he discharged the jurors, and heard of this cause, which has aroused so much interest, came to an end for the time being.

This action was as a result of the announcement in open court this morning by county Attorney A. M. Frazier that Governor Thomas M. Campbell had refused to grant his request that citizenship be restored to Joe Lovell Lovell is an ex-convict, and therefore, under the law, may not testify in case if there be objection thereto. The restoration of citizenship to objection would not obtain unless solely within the power of the governor of the state to grant this right one who has served a term in penitentiary.

May Derive All Animal Life on Earth Berkeley, Cal., Feb. 9.—Prof. Edwin Boy of the department of chemistry of the University of California said tonight that if the astronomers are correct in their estimate of the amount of cyanogen gas in the tail of Halley's comet there might be a chance for the extermination of all animal life on this earth. Some astronomers predict that the comet's tail will envelop the earth for a short time

MADRIZ PLANNING TO GO

Acting President of Nicaragua Opens Bank Account in New Orleans. May Have to Fly.

New Orleans, La., Feb. 10.—Dr. Madriz, acting president of Nicaragua, has opened a personal account with a New Orleans bank. His initial deposit is said to be \$15,000, and the banking firm is declared to be the same as that with which former President Zelaya had dealings. The authority for this statement is vouched for by the Central Americans here. They take it to mean that Madriz realizes that conditions are serious in Nicaragua and that he may have to flee the country in case Estrada is victorious, and he is fixing himself for such a move.

GRAND JURY INVESTIGATION

Into the Death of Col. Swope at Kansas City, Mo.

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 10.—At the request of Virgil Conkling, prosecuting attorney, Judge Latslaw of the criminal court has issued a call for the grand jury to investigate the Swope death and case. The jury will meet Saturday. Conkling refused to take the responsibility of ordering an arrest or of making one.

STEAM PIPE EXPLODED

While St. Paul Mine Was Being Opened Up at Cherry, Ill., Endangering the Rescuers.

Cherry, Ill., Feb. 10.—The work of clearing the tunnels of the St. Paul mine, preparatory to removing the two hundred dead bodies still in the lower levels of the mine, was stopped today by an explosion which occurred in the tunnel with scalding steam and endangered the lives of a score of miners working in it. No one was hurt, but the work cannot be resumed for the next twenty-four hours.

GUS IS DOING FINE.

Doctors Only Make One Visit a Day to Bedside of Swedish King.

Stockholm, Sweden, Feb. 10.—King Gustave is recovering so rapidly from the operation for appendicitis that the doctors are now making but one visit a day to the bedside of the sick king.

SPITZER GOES TO ATLANTA

Dock Superintendent of the American Sugar Refining Company Gets Sentence of Two Years.

(Herald Special.)
New York, Feb. 10.—Oliver Spitzer, former dock superintendent of the American Sugar Refining company in Williamsburg, who was convicted of conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with the short weights in the sugar imports, was today sentenced to two years in the penitentiary at Atlanta. The company checkers convicted at the same time as Spitzer are now serving one year each on Blackwell's Island. Spitzer has been in the hospital for some time, and could not be sentenced before today. He will appeal his case.
