MAY YOU GO TO THE POLE

San Antonio Doctor Believes Commander Peary Will Accept His Offer and Prove Claims.

(Herald Special.)
San Antonio, Texas, March 8.—Dr. Frederick J. Fielding is of the opinion that Commander Peary may yet accept his offer to provide him with a dirigible balloon for the purpose of proving definitely that he has discovered the North Pole.

"I notice from press dispatches that Peary has declined my offer, but am of the opinion that he may yet consider the matter," said Dr. Fielding.

Asked whether he intended to go to the North Pole himself, Dr. Fielding said that he was not an explorer and had no particular inclinations to enter that field.

"Going there by myself would prove nothing," he said. "Whether the poles are discovered or not is not of the slightest interest to me considered per se. The only thing I want to do is to set all minds at rest that the pole is discovered. Outside of that the proposition does not interest me in the least. In my estimation the knowledge gained by the discovery of the pole is not of great value, but the knowledge that the North Pole has or has not been discovered. With me it is a case of keeping the record straight that's all. There is no use in burdening geographers and the mind of future generations with a statement that has yet no corroboration. And here I want to reiterate that I do not doubt Mr. Peary's records. Still that does not prevent me from taking the stand I am taking. What I would like to see done is to have the matter settled without the slightest chance for future dispute. I think that a commission of scientists appointed by the government, in which I would like to have at least one foreigner, possibly a man from the Copenhagen University, would settle the question definitely."
