The state makes the laws regulating and governing railroads, and the commission appears to think that only the state's railroad is the one line failing to observe those very laws. If such should be true the report will be read with interest.

### TO RECOVER GRAFT MONEY. Action is Brought By the State of Pennsylvania.

Harrisburg, Pa., March 7.—Action in equity for the recovery by the state of at least \$5,000,000 alleged to have been illegally paid to contractors for furnishing the new state capitol was entered in the Dauphin county court today by the attorney general's department. The actions are against the contractors, John Sanderson, deceased, and the Pennsylvania Construction company. The suits are the outgrowth of the capitol investigation

in 1907 and are entirely separate from criminal actions brought over two years ago.

### Grafters Are Convicted.

Philadelphia, March 7.—The conviction of William Snyder and James Shumaker, charged with conspiring to defraud the state, in connection with furnishing the state capitol, was affirmed by the state supreme court here today. Snyder is a former state treasurer, and Shumaker former superintendent of public buildings and grounds.
