STATEWIDE FIGHT IS ON

In Missouri—Forty Thousand People Petition For Such a Change In the State Constitution.

(Herald Special.)
Jefferson City, Mo., March 10.—The fight for statewide prohibition in Missouri took on definite form today when W. H. Wallace of Kansas City filed a petition for such an amendment to the state constitution. The petition contains the signatures of forty thousand persons, representing thirteen districts of the state. According to the initiative and referendum law only twenty-four thousand names are required and eleven districts are necessary to be represented, so it is assured that the prohibition amendment will be placed on the ballots for the vote of the people at the coming November election.

PROSECUTION THROUGH

In the Ballinger-Pinchot Investigation Matter—Great Volume of Testimony Taken.

Washington, D. C., March 10.—With the testimony of former Secretary of the Interior Garfield, who was on the witness stand today in the Ballinger-Pinchot controversy, the prosecution will practically have completed its case. Thus far fifteen hundred printed pages of testimony has been taken. Much of this testimony has been circumstantial, depending largely upon inference for interpretation. Practically all of the oral testimony except that of Secretary Wilson has been favorable to Pinchot.

A FACTORY WALL FELL

And Buried Thirty Men Under the Debris—Nine Have Been Removed, Two of Them Dead.

Pittsburg, Pa., March 10.—A wall fell at the bolt factory of M. Lanze & Son here today, and according to the report received at police headquarters twenty-five or thirty men were buried by the debris. Patrol wagons and ambulances were rushed to the scene. A later report from the scene says nine of the men have been removed from the ruins, two of whom are dead.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 10.—Despite Police Director Clay's proclamation that the strikers could not hold a mass meeting in the National League baseball park this afternoon, positive instructions were issued this morning to all strikers to assemble at the Lehigh and Broad streets corner this afternoon and march to the park. The striking carmen each received \$50 today as the first strike benefit. Ten thousand strikers assembled outside the park. Soon after they

BEATING HIS SCHEDULE

Ex-President Roosevelt and Party Will Arrive in Khartoum Three Days Ahead of Time.

Khartoum, March 10.—Ex-President Roosevelt and son, Kermit, will arrive here Monday afternoon, fully three days ahead of the earliest figured schedule. Word from Colonel Roosevelt today says the party left Tauffkia last night and is coming north at full speed. Mrs. Roosevelt and Miss Ethel will not arrive here until a few hours before the arrival of the colonel. In the absence of the sidar the inspector general of Soudan will entertain the Roosevelts during their stay in this city. The party will be guests at the Khartoum palace, and will remain here until next Thursday, on which day they leave for Cairo, probably arriving there on March 24th.

TWO WOMEN WOUNDED

American Tourists Fired on By Afghan Fanatic at the Mosque in Omar, Jerusalem.

Washington, D. C., March 10.—Two American women were wounded by an Afghan fanatic who fired on a party of tourists visiting the mosque in Omar, Jerusalem, according to a dispatch received by the state department today from Consul Thomas R. Wallace. Miss Parker Moore of Terre Haute, Ind., is seriously wounded, but will recover, and Miss Natalie Maurice of Mamaroneck, N. Y., received a slight wound in the neck.

Swindlers on Trial.
