ALL FOR CULBERSON NO "ROAST" IS COMING

Texan Choice of Democratic Powers as Presidential Candidate of Party For 1912.

San Antonio, Texas, March 11.—Senator Charles A. Culberson of Texas is the choice of the democratic powers that be to make the race for the presidential candidacy in 1912, according to local democrats today, following a conference here called by National Committeeman Roger Sullivan of Illinois and National Chairman Mack. It is claimed that the democratic presidential prospects were looked over and Sullivan was convinced that Culberson is the strongest man available.

J. P. MORGAN NOT DEAD

But Report That He Was Started Quite a Flurry in Wall Street This Afternoon.

New York, March 11.—The report that J. P. Morgan had dropped dead in Florence, Italy, was circulated on the stock exchange this afternoon, and for a time the story caused quite a flurry in financial circles. At the office of J. P. Morgan & Co. it was stated that the rumor was unqualifiedly false. The office had been in recent communication with Morgan and his health was reported excellent. They could not say just where the rumor had its origin.

BUSINESS TAKES HAND

Commercial Interests Hold Mass Meeting to Try and Devise Way to End the Strike.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 11.—Representatives of the commercial, fraternal and banking business, acting through the Merchants' Association, will participate in a meeting this afternoon having in view the object of seeking to end the strike trouble here. A potent factor in helping to end the strike may be the decrease in the value of the traction company's stock, which has already dropped seven dollars per share.

Washington, D. C., March 11.—Representative James H. Perkins of Rochester, New York, died at the Garfield hospital here this morning, after a week's illness.

From Teddy White Out of the Country is the Opinion of a Well Known Correspondent.

New York, March 11.—The opponents of the present administration who are racing the Nile in the expectation of getting a statement from ex-President Roosevelt relative to the insurgent movement, the Ballinger-Pinchot controversy or on any other political question or condition, will find another sphinx in the land of the Pharos, is the opinion of Warrington Dawson, United Press staff correspondent with the Roosevelt hunting party. Owing to the death of his mother Dawson has just returned to this country, after being relieved by another correspondent at the head waters of the Nile. Dawson says he believes Roosevelt will be pleased to hear the news from the correspondents but that he will make no statement on the issues. Dawson also declares it is his opinion that Roosevelt will lead a private life on his return home.

Correspondents Reach Roosevelt.

Benk, Soudan, March 11.—(By Staff Correspondent United Press.)—Roosevelt arrived here today aboard steamer and was immediately surrounded by the group of American correspondents who came here to intercept him on his journey to Cairo. The correspondents came in a body on a specially chartered steamer, the Abbas. Col. Roosevelt greeted the newspaper men amid cheers with his characteristic enthusiasm, all being personal friends, but if they expected him to loosen up on political questions they were keenly disappointed, for the ex-president absolutely refused to make any comment on American politics. To the contrary he asked all the questions and had the correspondents answering his inquiries. The colonel is in perfect health, but other members of the party are somewhat worn by the lengthy journey. Roosevelt has a fine tan and seems as hard as a prize fighter trained for a fight.
