

## BALLINGER AND PINCHOT

Among the Speakers to Be Heard at the Minnesota Conservation and Development Congress.

(Herald Special.)

St. Paul, Minn., March 16.—The Auditorium was the scene today of the assemblage of many distinguished figures in the political, industrial and educational life of the nation. It was perhaps the most notable gathering that has ever met in the northwest to consider questions of great public importance. The occasion was the opening of the first Minnesota Conservation and Agricultural Development Congress, which convened in response to a proclamation issued some time ago by Governor Eberhart.

Promptly at 10 o'clock this morning the congress was called to order by Governor Eberhart and was opened with an address by Archbishop Ireland. The opening addresses, appointment of the necessary committees and other incidental business occupied the remainder of the forenoon.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon the delegates reassembled to discuss the subject of "State Conservation and Development." The program of the session provided for addresses as follows: "Practical Conservation and Agricultural Development in Minnesota," Governor A. O. Eberhart; "National Conservation and the Obligations and Opportunities of the States," Richard A. Ballinger, Secretary of the

Interior; "Minnesota—a State on the Eve of a Wonderful Future," Prof. A. Woods, dean of the Minnesota State Agricultural College.

The congress will continue in session through the remainder of the week. The prominent speakers to be heard include Gifford Pinchot, former chief forester of the United States; James J. Hill, of the Great Northern Railway; Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, chief of the bureau of chemistry of the Department of Agriculture; Dr. Charles R. Van Hise, president of the University of Wisconsin; Dr. John F. Fulton, president of the Associated Charities of New York City, and C. J. Blanchard, of the United States reclamation service.

Much interest centers in the addresses of Secretary Ballinger and Gifford Pinchot, not only because of the high stations the federal government has given them, but also because of the decided differences as to policy which has brought them into sharp conflict with each other.

## BUSY DAY AHEAD FOR TAFT

President Will Visit Chicago Thursday, and Will Be on the Go During His Stay.

(Herald Special.)

Chicago, March 16.—From the moment when President Taft steps from the train, at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning, into the arms of a reception committee, until 10:30 p. m., when he will depart for the east, every minute will be turned to account. The forenoon will be spent in visits to the Chicago Newspaper Club, the Chicago Press Club and the Traffic Club. The president will take luncheon at the Hotel LaSalle as the guest of Edward Hines.

The afternoon program will begin with a visit to the convention of the American Association of Engineers of Maintenance of Way, in session at the Congress Hotel. From the hotel the president will be conducted across the street to the Auditorium, where he will deliver a brief address at the conservation mass meeting. Thence a journey of another block will bring him to the Fine Arts building, where he has promised to greet the Daughters of the American Revolution. After a brief visit to the Hamilton Club he will return to the Hotel LaSalle for the reception and banquet of the Irish Fellowship Club.

The arrangements for the banquet have been made on an elaborate scale. The affair is to be held in three dining rooms, so large has been the demand for seats, but all guests will be seated in the main hall when the addresses are made. President Taft will probably not be present at the

Trachoma is particularly prevalent among the Indians in the Southwest. In the Indian villages in the Southwest from 11 to 54 per cent of the Indian children have this disease of the eyes. In Arizona 51 per cent and in California 54 per cent were found and in one village 74 per cent was found. It is said to be no uncommon event to find a great many Indians suffering from trachoma on the reservations.

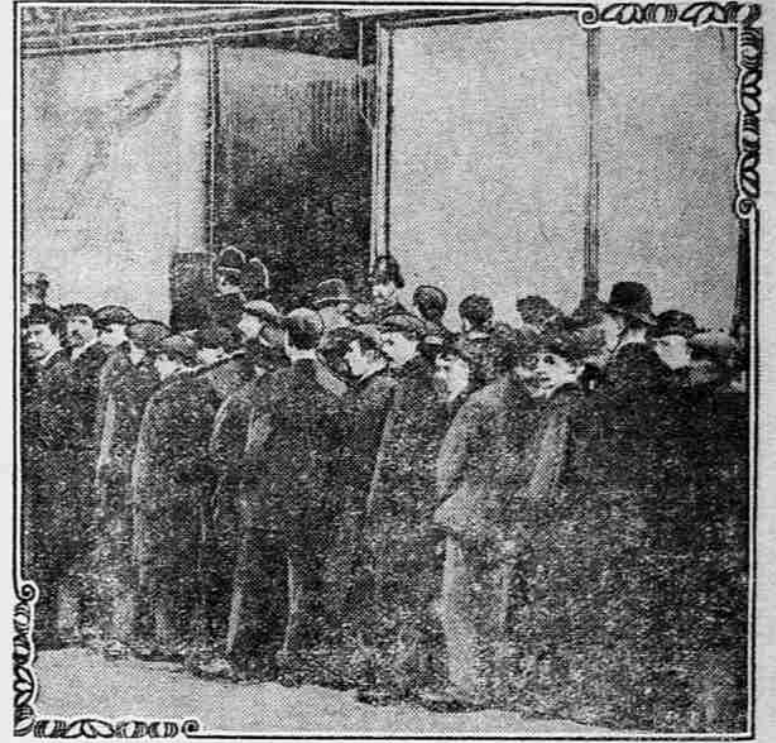

### SAVE INDIAN FROM EXTINCTION.

Tuberculosis and Trachoma Prove Scourges in the Villages.

Washington, March 15.—To save the red race from extinction from the families of mankind, the bureau of Indian affairs is prosecuting its health campaign among the Indians with all the vigor possible. In furtherance of its crusade, Dr. Jos. A. Murphy, medical supervisor of the Indian service, has left Washington to investigate conditions on a number of reservations and in several Indian schools in the West and Southwest with particular attention to tuberculosis and trachoma. The two diseases are scourges among the Indians.
