TOURO INFIRMARY REGULAR MEETING.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Managers of the Touro Infirmary and Hebrew Benevolent Association was held at the Infirmary Sunday afternoon, President Sam Blum in the chair, secretary at his desk and the following members of the board present: Messrs. E. V. Benjamin, Abe Blum, Jacob D. Dresner, Chas. Godchaux, Edw. Goetz, M. M. Goldman, Rev. Max Heller, Leonard Krower, Lazare Levy, Rev. I. L. Leucht, Matt J. Wolf, Dr. A. L. Metz, Simon Pfeifer, Max Schwabacher, Sol Stern, Nat Strauss, Herman Weil and Simon Weins. The minutes of the last meeting, held October 11th, were read and approved. The monthly bills for October were approved and ordered paid at the office of the treasurer, Mr. Abe Blum, 321 Gravier street, on the 20th.

Mr. A. B. Tipping, superintendent, submitted his report of ad-

missions, etc., for the month ending October 31st, as follows: Patients remaining October 1, 76; admitted during the month, free 52, pay 126, total 178; total treated during the month, 254; less discharged, 159; died, 8; total, 167; leaving remaining in the infirmary November 1, free patients 41, pay patients 46, total 87. In the Julius Weis Home for the Aged and Infirm, inmates remaining October 1st, women, 8, men, 17, total 25; less died 1 man, leaving remaining the home women 8, men 16.

Rev. I. L. Leucht, first vice

president, submitted his report, showing amount expended for charity and relief during the month of October, \$299.75, and the summary worked in his department, as follows: Stipendaries monthly, 13; sundry assistance granted to 22, declined to 3, assisted with food and coal 4, transportation granted to 2. He also submitted the report of Dr. Jules Lazard, physician and surgeon to the poor, from October 11th to November 7th, as follows: Patients treated, 12; house visits, 18; office consultations, 12.
