proclaims to us there shall be absolute equality.

Our gathering this day is charged with no slight significance, is spired by no trivial emotion. We are here to speak the naked truth to our own hearts. To examine ourselves, perhaps to condemn our-selves, but above all, to better ourselves, for "returning;" mending our ways is the essence of repentance.

As measured by material sacrifices, we are not seriously at fault. You sustain your religious institutions sufficiently. Yet, though it may be a shock to your race pride, it must be admitted that we have still much to learn from our neighbors in really princely generosity to religion. But if the chief standard of measurement is, after all, not material sacrifices, they, after all, grow out of an enthusiasm and devotion that are spiritual and are difficult to estimate, because, being spiritual, they are intangible.

United in Friendship. This is the day of atonement, the

day of reconciliation with God and with man. If there are-God forbid-families rent asunder, let them be united in love on this holy night. If there are old friends, long severed and discordant, let them again extend their hand in friendship. live but a little while. We are all frail. Let us forgive and forget.

Today the High Priest on Zion's heights made atonement for himself and his household and for all the people of Israel. And I confess before you my many shortcomings humbly and sincerely, and may God help me to serve you more worthily. I confess before him the sins of the people, their grievous faults. May he move their hearts and turn them from their old ways into new ways, and through them may he save and strengthen our holy faith, may he save and strengthen us.
