TEXAS SENATE IS REBATING THE ALAMO MISSION MEASURE TODAY

AUSTIN, TEN., March 4.—The senate spent the entire morning session considering the Alamo mission property bill. The house bill, which places the property under the executive control of the Daughters of the Republic, is under consideration with an amendment by senator Hudspeth, which places the property under the control of the governor, and a substitute by senator Gray, which creates a commission to control the property, are all pending. and senate. Very little attention has thus far been paid to the joint resolution by senator McCreary, which proposes an amendment in order to secure the suffrage in the organic law of the state. Grave doubt is entertained as to the final adoption of this resolution, and the chances for the adoption of the amendment by the people, appears to be even more remote.

Constitutional Convention Representative Humphrey apparently as determined as ever to push his joint resolution providing for the submission to a vote of the people, the question of a constitutional convention. At first it appeared as if it would be likely that the resolution would be adopted, but since the introduction of the prohibition question into the subject, it has placed a different phase on the matter. With this as an issue, if the anti-stand together, there is no chance to muster a two-thirds vote in the house or senate on the proposition. In the light of recent developments, there is little doubt entertained but that a section of a new constitution for Texas would be devoted to the prohibition question.

Platform Demands. Despite the fact that the platform demands were to have been given preference in the house, according to the rules adopted by that body, little attention has as yet been given to these demands or rather recommendations. It is apparent that the house, and the senate, too, for that matter, are not respecting of platform recommendations. The so-called "progressive" element in the legislature insists that these are not in any sense demands, but merely recommendations, and if not adhered to, would not place any odium on the political reputation of the legislature.

POWERS CONSIDER TURKEY'S APPLICATION FOR MEDIATION. London, Eng., March 4.—Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign minister, presided at a meeting of the ambassadors of the powers to consider Turkey's application for mediation in the Balkan situation. Reports are published in Vienna of an Albanian uprising against Serbian occupation of the Balkan territory. According to reports communication with Scutari has been reopened and the garrison has been supplied with arms and ammunition.

ITALY URGES MODERATION IN DEMANDS OF THE ALLIES. Rome, Italy, March 4.—Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign minister, stated to induce them to observe moderation in their demands on Turkey, and thus bring about peace at an early date. The appointment of Gen. Bovovich, London conference, as commander of the forces besieging Scutari, is considered an indication of the firm determination of the Serbians and Montenegrins to take Scutari at any cost.

ESTIMATES DAMAGE DONE TO COURTHOUSE AT CARRIZO. Carrizozo, N. M., March 4.—M. Campbell, a Santa Fe architect, who was employed to appraise the damage done to the county buildings at Carrizozo since the construction was stopped two years ago, was here today, but refused to give out any statements as to what amount he believed would be necessary to replace the buildings. DISTRICT ATTORNEY MEASURE HAS PASSED BOTH NEW MEXICO HOUSES

House on Monday Failed to Pass the County Salaries Bill Over the Veto of the Governor, Lacking Two Votes—Work on Appropriation Bills Is in Progress in Both of the Houses.

SANTA FE, N. M., March 4.—The house Monday postponed action on the passage of the salary bill over the veto of the governor, there apparently being three votes too few to pass the measure. The vote to postpone the measure was 39 to 17. This was considered a test and was one in fact, but there are two votes upon which the pro-bill advocates are counting that did not appear Monday. There was one man expected to vote with them who did not do so, and one man expected to vote against them who was with them. This totaled up their strength as 32.

When the measure came up it was immediately moved by Maj. Llewellyn to do away with it until today. Mr. Hancy moved to table this, but lost, 18 to 29. The daily squabble in the senate was devoted to the bill placing the state library under the control of the supreme court and was remarkable for its intensity. The bill was passed. The house concurred in the senate amendments to the bill for the introduction of the 26th bill, which is nine higher than the previous record.

Senate bill 36, the Johnson grass liquor by physicians was read and amended. Senator Hinkle opposed this measure because it was too stringent and would curtail the boarding of county treasurers where custodians of school funds was passed. Senate bill 125, prohibiting the prescription of medicine by physicians, was tabled. Senate bill 126, creating the office of oil inspector, was tabled. Senate bill 127, creating the supervision by district courts of estates in probate courts, was tabled. Senate bill 128, the public utilities bill, was tabled. Senate bill 129, allowing the management of the state hospital for the insane to continue until the next session, was tabled. Senate bill 130, the sheep dip act, upon which a conference was held, was sent back to the committee on livestock. House bill 141, creating a normal school at Clayton, was tabled.

House bill 55, locating the Camino Real between Santa Fe and Albuquerque, and providing for its immediate construction, was so amended as to include only the section from the capital to the county line, and passed. House bill 56, the sheep dip act, upon which a conference was held, was sent back to the committee on livestock. House bill 57, creating a normal school at Clayton, was tabled.

For Working Roads. Senate substitute for senate bill 75 providing that the directors of road districts shall call on all able-bodied men from two to five days' labor on the roads, was passed. The act is so drafted that a city or town is a road district and labor or money obtained from the district may be expended on its streets. Senate substitute for house joint resolution 11, appropriating \$156,500 to cover the deficiency of the 1911 carrying board, was passed. Senate substitute for senate bill 146, relating to the election of boards of trustees in incorporated villages, was passed. This makes their term of office two years and their date of election in April of the even years. Senate substitute for senate bill 65, a companion bill, provides that boards of education shall be elected every two years, the odd years so that the constitutional provision prohibiting their election at the same time as other officers, is fulfilled. It also was passed. Committee substitute for senate bill 75, relating to procedural appeal cases from justice courts, was passed.

New Senate Bills. The following bills were introduced: Senate bill 156, by Mr. Bowman, a weights and measures bill. Senate bill 157, by Mr. Bowman, providing for the sprinkling of streets at the expense of the owners of abutting property. 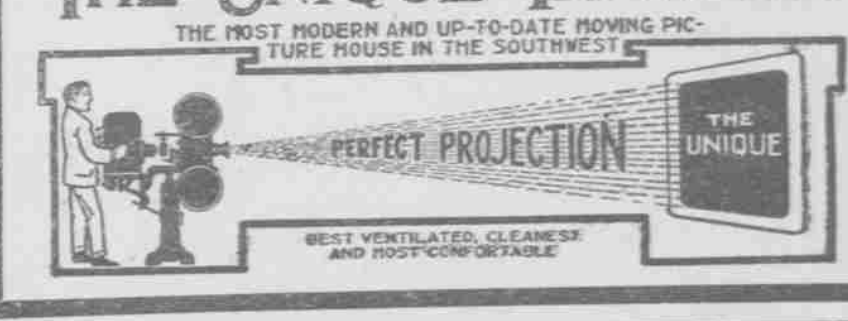
