According to the statements of the three national banks of this city, as published last Saturday, the aggregate individual deposits subject to check amount to nearly one and a half million dollars. This is almost excellent showing and indicates that the financial condition of Waxahachie and her trade territory is in splendid shape. It is estimated that about two-thirds of these deposits belong to the farmers in the country tributary to Waxahachie. The deposits as shown by each bank are as follows:

Citizens National, \$583,514.14; Waxahachie National, \$429,150.83; First National, \$372,055.77; total, \$1,384,720.74.

For the Poor.

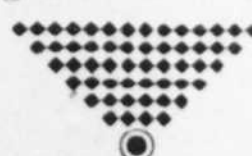

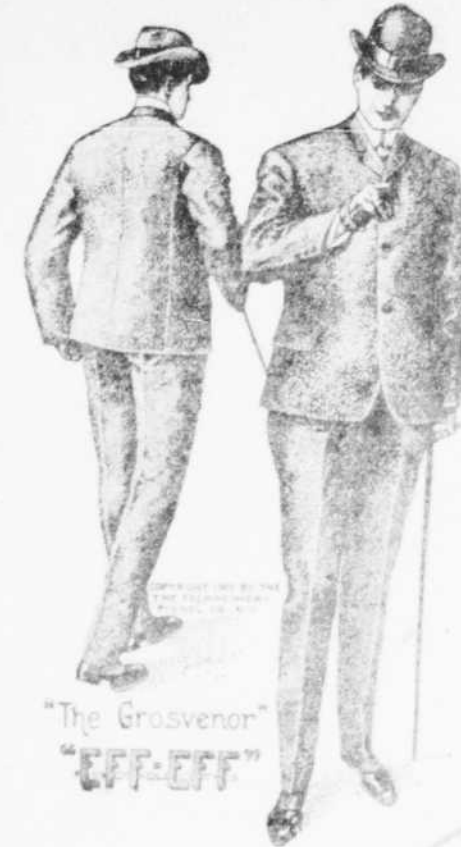
