THE DEAD ARE HONORED

Little Mounds Over Sleeping Veterans
Strewn with Flowers.

Memorial Day exercises were held at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the Main Street Christian church under the auspices of the Sims-Watson Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy. On account of rain the attendance was light and only a few of the old veterans were in the audience. Special seats were reserved for the members of Camp Winnie Davis, the Daughters of the Confederacy and the Dunlap Rifles. The program was appropriate to the occasion and was composed of addresses and musical numbers.

The exercises opened with the hymn, "Nearer My God to Thee," sung by the audience.

The invocation was offered by Rev. B. A. Copass.

Following a song by a quartette of ladies Prof. W. L. Acker, superintendent of the city public schools, delivered an eloquent address on the subject of "Memorial Day." Prof. Acker paid fine tributes to the soldiers of both armies.

The address of Prof. Acker was followed by a song by a male quartette.

"Is It the Duty of the South to Observe These Memorial Days," was the subject of a splendid address by Hon. J. C. Lumpkins. His address was given close attention and received with approbation.

The list of Confederate and Federal dead, who are buried in the City Cemetery, was then read by Adjutant Ryburn of Camp Winnie Davis.

The reading of the list was followed by the song, "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," sung by the audience.

The next feature of the program was the conferring of crosses of honor on veterans by the children's auxiliary. Only one veteran went forward to receive a cross.

A prayer was offered by Rev. J. C. Smith and after Rev. N. Givens had pronounced the benediction the people adjourned to the City Cemetery where the graves of those who wore the gray and those who wore the blue were strewn with a profusion of flowers.

Wedding Near Crisp.

Mr. T. L. Sullivan, a prominent citizen of the Crisp community, was in the city Saturday to procure a marriage license for his son, Henry Sullivan, and Miss Naomi Yowell, daughter of his neighbor, Mr. J. M. Yowell. The marriage of these young people was solemnized Sunday.

A very interesting incident is connected with this marriage. Mr. Sullivan and Mr. Yowell were in the Confederate army and at the battle of Franklin, Tenn., the latter was badly wounded. He was taken to the rear by Mr. Sullivan who remained with him and nursed him until he had recovered from his wounds. At the close of the war they separated and never met again for a period of about thirty years. A few years ago Mr. Yowell settled in the Crisp community where they met and renewed their old time friendship, which resulted in a union of the two families by the marriage of Mr. Sullivan's youngest son to the youngest daughter of Mr. Yowell.

TO TEST ORDINANCE

Fruit Vendor Appeals to Judge Hawkins on Writ of Habeas Corpus.

Among the many ordinances ordained by the city council of Waxahachie is one which provides that it is unlawful for auctioneers, hawkers and vendors of merchandise to ply their vocation on the public square or streets of Waxahachie. This ordinance, like some other ordinances of the city, has never been very rigidly enforced. When O. H. Chapman was city attorney he held to the opinion that the ordinance was not effective for the reason that it was in contravention to the laws of the state.

Saturday morning E. Wiley, a fruit vendor from Dallas, came to the city and began peddling oranges and bananas on the streets. He was arrested by a city officer on the charge of violating the above ordinance. The vendor engaged the services of T. P. Whipple, and Saturday afternoon went before Recorder Ross for a trial. A trial of the case was gone into, but the jury failed to agree upon a verdict and a mistrial was entered on the docket. The case was set for another hearing today, but as it was known that Wiley's attorney would make a fight to test the validity of the ordinance City Attorney Love agreed for the matter to be determined before again going into a trial of the case. The matter was taken before County Judge Hawkins on a writ of habeas corpus. The application for habeas corpus proceedings was prepared this morning and was presented to the court this afternoon.
