## ARE WITHIN RANGE.

Russian Lines of Defenses Have Been Much Weakened.

## JAPS ARE CONFIDENT

It is the Belief at Tokio That Both Sides Have Greatly Suffered, and Siege Will Be Bloodiest Since Sedan.

Tokio, Aug. 25.—The final assault on Port Arthur is imminent. Hundreds of Japanese guns continue to pour a destructive fire into the city and harbor along the lines of forts and entrenchments preparatory for the infantry assault. It is evident that the Russian lines have been weakened and partly penetrated in the vicinity of Auteshan and Iteshan forts. The entire line of Russian defenses immediately about the harbor are within range of the Japanese guns. A number of Russian forts and batteries continue to be vigorous. The Japanese death rolls will be heavily increased before they are captured. The direction of the Japanese attacks creates the impression here that the city and defenses on either side of the harbor entrance will fall first. The final stand will be made at Liaotshan. Official channels of information remain closed, and the navy department announced the striking of a mine by the battleship Suvaevapool and the firing upon the Russian forts by the cruisers Niashin and Kasuga Tuesday are the only disclosures made for several days. It is believed here that both sides have suffered heavy losses, and that the final record will make the siege the bloodiest since Sedan.

The Japanese are supremely confident of the ultimate result. The leaders of the government await the outcome in calm assurance. The people are everywhere decorating streets and houses and erecting arches and flag-staffs in preparation for a national celebration of the expected victory.

## FROM KUROKI.

Russians Are Reported to Be Fortifying Liao Yang.

Fusan, Aug. 25.—Fair weather has returned. It is hoped that this is the last stretch of the wet season. Streams are falling and the scaly soil is absorbing the water rapidly. The Russians are reported to be fortifying Liao Yang extensively.

Light defenses are being made in front of An Ping, a few miles ahead of General Kuroki. There has been no fighting recently.

## Important Events.

London, Aug. 25.—The absence of dispatches of any kind from the far east Thursday morning leads to the belief, expressed editorially in the London newspapers, that important events are impending. The mystery regarding the movements of the Russian cruiser which recently overhauled the British steamer Comedian is still unsolved.

## Flags Lowered.

London, Aug. 25.—The correspondent of the Times at Shanghai in a dispatch dated Aug. 24, says that orders from Emperor Nicholas have been conveyed to Captain Reitsenstein commanding him forthwith to disarm the cruiser Askold and the torpedo boat destroyer Grosuovoi, and that the flags on both vessels were lowered at 7 o'clock Wednesday night.

## Welcomed by Newspapers.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 25.—The newspapers are unanimous in welcoming the abolition of corporal punishment as the most important concessions embodied in the manifesto.

## ELEVEN HURT.

Frisco Passenger and Freight Trains Come Together.

Joplin, Mo., Aug. 25.—The St. Louis and San Francisco passenger train through for St. Louis collided with a westbound freight train near Sarcoux Wednesday. Eleven passengers were injured, none it is believed fatally. Every person on the passenger train was badly shaken up. The train was crowded. Both trains were running at high speed. Both engines were completely demolished. The baggage and mail cars were thrown from the track and turned over, and all except two coaches left the rails. Both engines jumped and escaped injury.

## PARKER'S LETTER.

Proof of It Will Be Ready About Fifth of September.

Exopus, N. Y., Aug. 25.—Judge Parker Wednesday worked on his letter of acceptance of the nomination, which will be made public probably about Sept. 12 or 15. The letter will be printed in Kingston, and it is expected the proof will be ready about Sept. 5.

## TWO MEN HANGED.

Wife Murderers Executed on Same Scaffold in Mississippi.

Rolling Fork, Miss., Aug. 25.—Albert Davis and Dave Fields, wife murderers, were hanged here from the same scaffold. A large crowd witnessed the execution.

## Imported Many Years.

Chicago, Aug. 25.—Alfred H. Black, all one of Chicago's oldest merchants, is dead at his residence, after a short illness. He was eighty years old, and had been in the tea and coffee importing business in this city for fifty-two years.

Honolulu, Aug. 24.—The Democratic territorial convention nominated C. P. Leuke a delegate to congress.

## PAPERS READ.

Next Session of the Association to Be Held at Guthrie.

St. Louis, Aug. 25.—The session of the Interstate Association of Livestock Sanitary Boards Wednesday was devoted to listening to, and discussion of papers read by different state veterinarians pertaining to livestock and livestock diseases and conditions.

Dr. Thomas Morris, a member of the sanitary board of Oklahoma, delivered the first address on "Conditions of Cattle in Oklahoma."

Dr. F. T. Eisman, state veterinarian of Kentucky, spoke on "Inspection of Cattle Handled by Railroad Companies."

The last paper was read by Dr. Keller, agent of the bureau of animal industry, who has been working in Texas. He talked of experiments of dipping southern cattle in Beaumont crude oil to free them from fever ticks.

The committee appointed to consider applications for changes in the time of shipping southern cattle to the north decided that the present established open season should land with a few changes in different districts of Oklahoma territory, which will be announced later, and the committee will make recommendations to this effect to the department of agriculture.

The committee to consider a possible change in the quarantine line established last year decided that the present boundary should not be changed, and will so recommend to the department of agriculture. The following officers were elected:

Secretary-Treasurer—Dr. S. H. Ward, Minneapolis.

The convention decided upon Guthrie, Okla., as the place for holding the convention next year and adjourned sine die.

## SECOND EFFORT.

Chicago Authorities Again Endeavoring to Settle Strike.

Chicago, Aug. 25.—The city authorities are to make a second effort to settle the stockyards strike. At a meeting of the city council Wednesday night a resolution was passed empowering Mayor Harrison to appoint a committee of eleven aldermen, who are to make it their business to bring about a settlement. There was some opposition to the resolution, a number of the aldermen declaring that in their opinion the result would be a failure. The resolution was passed, however, and the committee appointed by the mayor.

Invitations were at once sent to the leader of the strikers and to representatives of employers, inviting them to meet the members of the committee Thursday morning over the Erie.

The aldermanic committee has not mapped out any particular programme, but intends to see what it can do after it has listened to the statements from both sides.

Annie Clark, a forewoman for Nelson, Morris & Co., has been attacked by girl pickets while riding on a street car. A lively fight followed in which hat pins were the weapons used.

Miss Clark was severely injured and was removed to her home by the police. She recognized several of her assailants and secured warrants for their arrest.

The packers resumed the importation of a strike breaker on a large scale Wednesday. A special train of seven cars arrived over the Erie. Two carloads of strike breakers were brought in under heavy police guard over the Monon road.

## STANDISH ARRESTED.

Admitted He and a Confederate Stole Much Money.

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 25.—J. T. Laney, alias A. P. Standish, formerly receiving clerk of the Western Union Telegraph company at Dallas, Tex., was arrested here Wednesday on a telegram from the company at Dallas. The telegram specified no charges, but Laney, who is under twenty years old, admitted to the officers that he and a confederate, whose name is Black, alias Edmund Sealborn, had stolen \$1100 on bogus telegrams. He admitted that as receiving clerk he sent bogus telegrams for money to a confederate who traveled from city to city. Laney was forced to leave Dallas about a month ago, since which time he and his confederate have traveled extensively over the country, visiting St. Louis, Kansas City and Baltimore, where they separated. Laney then coming to Atlanta. From here he sent a telegram to a young woman in Dallas, which led to his arrest.

## LADY LOCKED UP.

Charged With Theft of Money, but Released From Prison.

Austin, Aug. 25.—According to a story told by Mrs. J. Pettus, wife of the manager of a big dry goods concern here, she was arrested and kept locked in a cell several hours at police headquarters in Galveston last Monday. After an investigation she was released and arrived here Wednesday morning. Her husband is highly indignant. He stated that he will sue Galveston. He left for Galveston with his wife.

Wright for thirty years connected with the business department of the Texas Christian Advocate, died Wednesday at Philadelphia. He was the eastern representative of the Advocate. It was in 1874 that Mr. Wright became connected with Shaw & Blylock, then publishers of the Advocate, at Galveston. Interment will be had at Dallas.

## CUTS HIS THROAT.

Dr. Jones Ends His Existence in Jail at Benjamin.

Seymour, Tex., Aug. 25.—Dr. L. P. Jones, confined in jail at Benjamin for the killing of his wife on Aug. 21, ended his life by cutting his throat, after having made his will.

## Shot Himself.

Beaumont, Tex., Aug. 25.—At Port Arthur Orest Heneker, aged forty-five years, an employee of the Texas company, shot himself in the breast, the ball from a revolver entering the left breast near the nipple and passing through the body, coming out in the back near the spinal column. His condition is serious.
