

TEXAS CATTLE MEN

Thirtieth Annual Meeting Attended by Hundreds.

IN SPLENDID SHAPE

Membership Is Over Seventeen Hundred and the Financial as well as Other Conditions are all Satisfactory.

Dallas, March 19.—When Hon. W. Turney, president of the Cattle Raisers' Association of Texas, called the thirtieth annual meeting to order in the Dallas opera house he did so in the presence of one of the largest gatherings the organization has ever known. Proceedings began a few minutes after 10 o'clock this morning.

Rev. George Edward Walk, dean of St. Ant. Lewis's cathedral, offered prayer.

On behalf of the city of Dallas Mayor Barry, in a happy speech, bade the visitors welcome.

In remarks replete with witticisms, and which were punctuated with applause, Judge C. N. Abtredge, representing the citizens' committee, gave

the cattlemen a most cordial invitation to make themselves at home.

Hon. A. G. Crowley of Midland responded to the welcoming addresses.

President Turney made annual report. It was an interesting account of what the association had done and advised as to the future action to be given.

Secretary John T. Lytle submitted the report of the executive committee. It was shown that the membership was now 1,755, and about 150 names had been added to the roll the past twelve months. The report stated the executive committee had wired Congressmen Russell asking him to push the through-haul bill through congress, so it could soon be sent to President.

It was shown the association was in a better condition, particularly from a financial standpoint, and that the business of the average cattlemen was in a healthy state. The report was applauded.

Professor John A. Craig, dean of the agricultural and mechanical college, delivered a well received address.

In the afternoon from 3 to 6 o'clock a reception was tendered the ladies of the stockmen at the Dallas club.

The Cattle Raisers' Association of Texas was organized in February, 1877, at Graham, Tex. T. L. Carter of Palo Pinto county was elected its first president, and was re-elected each succeeding year except one up to the time of his death in July, 1888. The term which he did not serve he was nominated for, but requested that he be allowed to retire, and that it be filled by Colonel C. C. Slaughter, who was elected to take his place in March, 1885. Colonel Slaughter served as president one year. At the annual meeting in 1886 Colonel Carter was again chosen president by acclamation without a dissenting vote, and was president when he died.

After the death of President Carter, A. P. Bush, Jr., of Colorado, Tex., was elected each year to fill the position up to March, 1899. At the annual meeting of that year Mr. Bush declined re-election, and J. R. Kleburg of Alice was elected. Mr. Kleburg was re-elected at the meeting of 1900 and served for two years.

Murdo MacKenzie was elected president at the meeting of 1901, and was re-elected the next year serving the two-year limit under the by-laws.

At the annual meeting in March, 1905, W. W. Turney was elected.

PREARRANGED PLAN.

Idea Is Evidently to Stimulate Passions of People.

London, March 19.—The Times correspondent at Shanghai says: "The native papers, using the same block, have published the picture of the Nanchang magistrate's head after death, displaying ghastly wounds. It was evidently a prearranged plan to stimulate the passions of the people against foreigners. The increasing hostility of the vernacular press is viewed with complacency by the Chinese of the official class. The matter undoubtedly calls for diplomatic intervention."

The Nanchang magistrate referred to in the above dispatch stabbed himself, or was stabbed by a missionary at the time of the massacre of missionaries at Nanchang the latter part of February.

CASUALTIES MANY.

Sixty Deaths Reported, and Eight Hundred Injured.

London, March 19.—The Daily Telegraph's Tokio correspondent telegraphs regarding the earthquake Sunday in the vicinity of Kagi, Island of Formosa. He says that the railway lines were twisted, telegraph poles thrown down and houses destroyed. The correspondent says that the Nichi Shimbin states that the casualties exceed 100, and the Jiji Shimpō places them as high as 1,000.

An official dispatch, he adds, reports sixty deaths and many more persons injured, and 200 houses destroyed.

KATY FILES MORTGAGE.

Is For Twenty Million Dollars, and Covers Oklahoma Lines.

Guthrie, March 19.—The Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway company has filed with the territorial secretary a mortgage for \$20,000,000 in favor of the New York Trust company of New York, with C. VanBaren of St. Louis as trustee, covering all its lines and equipment in Oklahoma.
