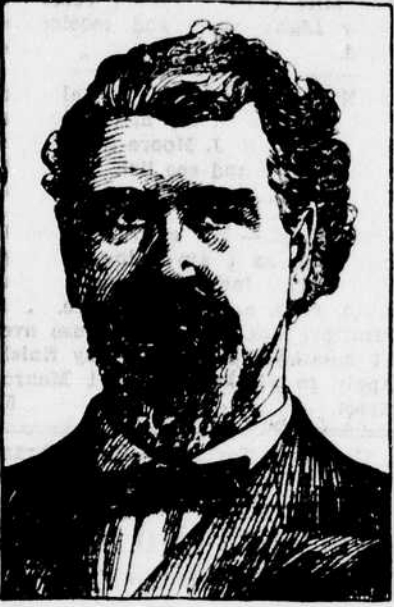
Noisy Scenes Enacted During Hot Springs Convention.

TAKE SMITH TO TASK

In Loud Voices Three Delegates Denied Assurances That He Made and For a Time Gathering Was Uncontrollable.

Hot Springs, June 6.—The Democratic state convention convened Tuesday at 12:30 o'clock, and after a stormy session effected only a temporary organization, with Judge J. W. Evans of Booneville chairman, and Hugh Corry of Texarkana secretary. For two hours, while plans were on foot, or the temporary organization, pandemonium reigned, and the presiding officers lost entire control of the convention. One speaker after another was recognized, only to be howled down, the spectators in the boxes and balconies taking part in the demonstration.

An accusation made by Hon. Jerry Smith against the Pulaski county delegation was the cause of the trouble. Mr. Smith stated that two years ago

the Pulaski county delegation pulled off their badges and stamped them and then left the hall because they were not allowed to dictate the policy of the convention. Immediately Messrs. Cockrell, Hicks and Williams of Little Rock were on their feet with clenched fists, shaking them at the speaker, and in loud voices denying the accusation. It was then that the convention became uncontrollable, and not until Congressman McKee appeared on the platform was any one allowed to be heard.

FORMER WIFE SUES.

Says White Made Fervid Love and Remarriage Agreed Upon.

Chicago, June 6.—Garland F. White, who owns a number of groceries in the southern part of the county and city, was made defendant in a breach of promise suit, brought by his divorced wife, Mrs. Gertrude White. Mr. White obtained a divorce last fall.

In her suit, she alleges that White made fervid love to her during the winter and spring, and that she finally consented to a remarriage. Last week White was married to Miss Eula Cushing, who was cashier in one of his stores, and Mrs. White promptly brought suit against her former husband for breach of promise, claiming damages to the amount of \$25,000.

DEATH BY WIND.

Two Persons Lose Their Lives and Sixty Houses Destroyed.

Oklahoma City, June 6.—Two persons were killed and sixty farm houses destroyed by a heavy wind and hail storm which swept over the southern portion of Oklahoma and Indian Territory Monday night. More than sixty families have been rendered destitute and the citizens of Chickasaw assembled in mass meeting and appointed committees to solicit funds to aid the unfortunate planters over the present season. The loss is very large, as practically all the big cotton acreage of this section was devastated.

TENSION GREAT.

Attempted Assault on Young Lady Causes Tremendous Excitement.

New Orleans, June 6.—As the result of an attempted assault on Miss Laura Davis by a negro of Alajays Tuesday night there was great tension, and a race that was the result. Thirty shots were reported fired before order was restored. Negroes took to cover.

Two Measures Passed.

Washington, June 6.—By unanimous consent the following bills were passed by the house: To create a new division of the Western judicial district in Texas; and to provide for the removal of actual settlers in pasture reservations, No. 2, to purchase land to be used for agricultural purposes in certain counties—Oklahoma.

WHAT JUNTA SAYS.

Claim to Be Printing the Truth About Conditions at Cananea.

St. Louis, June 6.—Members of the Junta of the Mexican Liberal party, who say they believe they are the persons accused by United States Thompson of having incited the strike at the Greene Consolidated copper mines at Cananea, Mex., were found Tuesday at 2645 Lafayette avenue, where they are publishing a paper called the Regeneracion. Antonio Villareal, secretary of the junta, is in charge of the headquarters.

"We did not know that any one in St. Louis knew where we were," said Villareal. "Still, we are not afraid. They say we have tried to incite a revolution. That is not true. We have simply been printing the truth about the conditions at the Greene mines at Cananea. We have been calling attention to the evils which are following the invasion of Yankers into Mexico. We have been calling attention to the fact that the mining company pays American workmen \$5 a day and pays Mexicans only \$2.50 a day. We have been making a fight for a square deal for the Mexican laborers, and we will continue to fight. This is purely a labor fight, not a revolution, so far as we are concerned. Our great purpose is to overthrow Diaz. We shall not depart from that purpose until the work is accomplished. We do not hold ourselves responsible for the riot and bloodshed. We have nothing to fear. If they want us, they will find us here. We are ready, and we will fight."

GREENE'S STATEMENT.

Says It is Evident Malicious Reports Have Been Circulated.

Bisbee, Ariz., June 6.—Colonel W. C. Greene, president of the Greene Consolidated Copper company, who is in Cananea, Mex., sends the following signed statement to the Associated Press:

"Some accounts of disturbances at Cananea are very much exaggerated. The Mexican authorities are giving full protection to our interests, work being resumed at mines and smelters. General Torres is in absolute control of the situation. Evidently false and malicious reports have been extensively circulated by interested parties for mercenary motives."

MUENTNER HEARD FROM.

Pamphlet Written by Him is Mailed From New Orleans.

Chicago, June 6.—Eric Muentner, the Harvard instructor, whose wife died April 1 at Boston under mysterious circumstances, has been heard from. The relatives of his wife received Tuesday pamphlet unquestionably written by him, and mailed from New Orleans. The document, which consists of several thousand words, is entitled "Protest" and although it is unsigned, it is evident that it was written by Muentner.

As an introduction, several hundred words are devoted to a burlesque account of a supposed death, and then follows an extended criticism of those who have written and talked about him. As a last word in his own defense, he says:

"And if my fellow men call this protest of mine insanity, then I will spend the rest of my life on my knees, and beg the merciful Father in Heaven to take away all the rest, if need be, but to leave me my insanity."

Advises from New Orleans say inquiries at several printing offices there failed to disclose that the missing instructor had ordered any copies of his pamphlet printed there.

HOWARD'S FATE.

Believed to Have Been Burned to Death at Cananea, Mex.

Douglas, Ariz., June 6.—Ed Howard of Santa Barbara, Cal., was probably burned to death in the lumber yard fire at Cananea. He had a position in the company's office. Harry McIntosh, who was believed to have perished in the fire, is safe.

Captain Rynning went to Phoenix, having been called upon by Governor Kibbe to explain his action in leaving a territory in command of the volunteers when went to Cananea.

FAVORED BY FRANCIS.

Former Cabinet Official Endorses Bryan For President Nominee.

Jefferson City, Mo., June 6.—What is generally regarded as the most significant feature of the Democratic state nominating convention was the pointed and absolute endorsement of W. J. Bryan for the presidency in 1908 by David R. Francis of St. Louis, former governor and the secretary of the interior in President Cleveland's cabinet. The nominations were:

Rube Oglesby of Warrensburg for railroad and warehouse commissioner, and P. A. Case of Jefferson City for superintendent of public schools.

Temporary Chairman Ruberle declared that the Democrats would nominate Bryan for president in 1908 and elect him. The convention wildly cheered and applauded for five minutes.

Former Governor Francis said that the differences that have divided the Democracy exist no longer. He described Bryan as "a sincere lover of humanity and a patriotic citizen. He enlisted both Bryan and Cleveland amid profound cheering.

An invitation was sent to the captious Governor Folk to address the convention.

Governor Folk responded, and was cheered when he entered the hall and mounted the platform. He declared that Bryan would be nominated for president in 1908 and would be elected. He said the principles which Bryan had advocated in 1904 were then considered anarchistic, but are now considered the acme of patriotism.

During a debate following the report of the credentials committee G. V. Knack and H. B. Harvestie, delegates from St. Joseph, engaged in a fist fight. They were separated by the sergeant at arms.

EXCEEDS AMOUNT.

South Carolina Congressman Says Cotton is Manipulated.

Washington, June 6.—Representative Ellerbee of South Carolina introduced a resolution charging that the cotton acreage report of the department of agriculture, 1886,000 acres, giving an estimate of 28,788,000 acres, exceeds the amount actually planted, and is not warranted in the returns received by the department from its correspondents.

The resolution directs the department of agriculture to furnish the house tabulated sheets showing the estimate of acreage by the seven classes of correspondents, namely:

The field agents, the state agents, the county correspondents, the township correspondents, the ginners, the special correspondents and the individual farmers.

Mr. Ellerbee states that he has direct and positive information that this cotton crop has been manipulated to the disadvantage of the south, and alleges that one of the three traveling agents "was in two states" upon which they passed.

NEW DIRECTORS.

Finney Has Also Been Chosen as the Successor of House.

Dallas, June 6.—A special meeting of the board of directors of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway of Texas was held here Tuesday. Adrian H. Joline of New York and F. N. Finney of St. Louis were elected as new directors. F. N. Finney was elected president, to succeed the late Henry C. Rouse.

Mr. Joline was elected chairman of the board of directors at a meeting of the board at Parsons, Kan., Monday to succeed the late Mr. Rouse.

CHAMBERLAIN RE-ELECTED.

By a Tremendous Majority Woman Suffrage Defeated in Oregon.

Portland, June 6.—C. E. Chamberlain, Democrat, has been re-elected governor of Oregon by a majority of not less than 1,000 and perhaps as much as 2,500 over J. H. Whitecombe, Republican. J. Bourne, Jr., Republican, has received the popular nomination for United States senator by about 5,000 majority. W. R. Ellis, Republican, has been chosen congressman in the second district by a large majority over J. H. Graham, Democrat, and W. A. Hawley, Republican, has a safe lead over G. V. Galloway, Democrat, in the first district.

Woman suffrage was defeated by a tremendous majority.

SIX CHILDREN SHOCKED.

One of the Little Ones a Victim of Lightning Flash.

Bertram, Tex., June 6.—The seven-year-old daughter of N. A. Crawford, living eight miles northeast of this place, was killed by lightning. Six children were sitting at Mr. Crawford's farm gate, some 200 yards from the house, when a heavy peal of thunder broke forth and the children were seen to fall to the ground. Mr. Crawford, his wife and sister-in-law went at once to the place and found all unconscious, but succeeded in reviving all but one. The other children fully recovered.

Split Log Process.

Dr. W. E. Hall of Halsburg was in the city this morning. He says the rains have done some harm to the grain in his section but the damage is not very serious. Cotton, he says, is needing work, but the farmers cannot get into their crops until the rain ceases, and the result is that the cotton is getting in bad shape.

Dr. Hall has been at work dragging the road near his farm with the split log device since the first of January, and said this morning: "I want you Waco people to come and travel over this piece of road. It is a mile and a quarter long, and yesterday it was in fine shape, notwithstanding the fact that we had two inches of rain Saturday afternoon. Before the road was dragged a rain put the road in such shape that it was impossible to travel over it for several days after the rain, and the difference now is something quite noticeable. The road looks as if it was a regular graded road and I am certainly proud of it."

Dr. Hall says that he has dragged the road about eight times and the effect is highly satisfactory, and he believes the process is entirely feasible and practical.—Waco Times-Herald.
