STAGE ANNOUNCEMENTS.

Hedda Gabler.

Local theatregoers have a rare treat in store for them next Monday night when Miss Constance Crawley the celebrated English actress, supported by Arthur Maude and her London company, will produce Henrik Ibsen's greatest drama, "Hedda Gabler." The Shreveport, La., Times has the following to say of Miss Crawley and her associates:

"Miss Crawley is an artist to her very finger tips. As Hedda Gabler, in the play of the same name by Ibsen, the great Norwegian dramatist, she is the very part itself. She apparently feels it, she does not act. She is the character herself. And as is invariably the case in plays of this kind, and which emanate from the deep thinking brain of a man like Ibsen, so it is that such a character as that of Hedda, must necessarily call for an amount of dramatic skill, which might not be requisite in parts which do not demand as careful a conception of character and versatility, as in this case. But Miss Crawley was there with it all. She was Hedda Gabler.

"The company supporting her is exceptionally strong. It might, almost be said that quality prevailed rather than quantity. There were only six in the cast, but they were six good ones. How often has it been a case where quantity must take preference to quality? But there was the essence of rare quality last night that must have made those who were fortunate enough to witness the production, pleased with themselves, and with humanity in general. It was an artistic production carefully staged, devoid of anything supertheatrical, concise in conception, well constructed and well acted."

Sterling Stock Company.

The Sterling Stock company will come to the opera house Thursday night, March 28, for an engagement of three nights and matinee. Miss Sylvia Summers, who takes the leading feminine role, has appeared here before as Marguerite in "Faust." The company is now playing at Fort Worth and the Record has the following to say of last night's performance:

The story which has not a line to offend, tells of the susceptible artist who goes to the mountains for the summer and while there, despite the protests of friends and family marries Mercy Tucker, an untutored child of nature. It's only a little while later that he finds that his conception of things and Mercy's are as wide apart as the poles, and he loses patience with her ignorance and love is done. She, understanding the matter, goes away and to school. Five years pass and he meets her by accident and all ends happily.

Miss Sylvia Summers as Mercy gives a very acceptable rendering of the character, but seems more at home in the last act when she is the young woman of education and self-poise and wears a handsome evening gown.

There were specialties between acts. E. C. Sprague pleasing the house greatly with his monologue and singing, and Charles Miles receiving the unstinted praise his nimble dancing merited.

WAR ON GAMBLERS.

Every Known and Suspected Spot to Be Placed Under Arrest.

Dallas, March 26.—Chief of Police Brandenburg yesterday instructed the men of his department to arrest on sight and without warrant, any man known or suspected of being a gambler who shall be found walking the streets of Dallas. In discussing the matter the chief said: "The movement now on over the state to stop gambling shall certainly not lack sympathy or aid in Dallas. We are going to assume a great deal of responsibility in this matter. If the alleged gambler arrested cannot be convicted on this charge, we shall endeavor to have him fined for vagrancy. We are going to harass the gambling class to such an extent that they will find existence a hard go in Dallas.

"One of the strongest reasons for unusual strictness along this line is to prevent Dallas being made a dumping ground for gamblers run out of other cities.

"My instructions to the members of the Dallas department are strict, and I am going to see that they are obeyed. If we do not stop gambling in Dallas, it will not be because we failed to make the effort."
