TERRY BROTHERS HELD UNDER BOND

Dallas Boys Are Charged With Murder of Dr. Hugh Terry.

A PRELIMINARY HEARING

One Is Placed Under \$10,000 Bond, Two \$1,000 Each and the Fourth Under \$250—The Four Are Released.

Dallas, Texas, March 26.—The preliminary hearing of Roy Terry and his three young brothers, charged with murder in connection with the death of Dr. Hugh Terry, who was shot and stabbed in numerous places at the family home on State street, four nights ago, took place yesterday before Justice of the Peace Work. Roy Terry was held in the sum of \$10,000 bail; two of the other brothers in \$1,000 each, and the fourth in \$250. The brothers were all taken back to jail at 5 p. m. and friends began the effort to obtain sureties.

Yesterday evening the four brothers were released on bond.

OFFICERS BAG FIVE NEGROES.

Four of the Number Arrested in Connection with Burglary of Fruit Stand.

Four negroes have been arrested and placed in jail in connection with the robbery of the fruit stand near the Central passenger station Sunday night. The prisoners registered at the jail as Wallace Allen, Joe Wells, Will Odum and Watt Leon Brown. Brown was arrested at Mansfield Monday morning and Allen and Wells were caught in Fort Worth. Sheriff Forbes went to Fort Worth Monday night after the prisoners. After reaching there he learned that Will Odum, who lives in Waxahachie, was implicated in the burglary. Mr. Forbes called up his deputies and instructed them to arrest Odum. He was soon found and placed in jail. They will be held pending an investigation by the grand jury.

On the return trip home Tuesday morning Sheriff Forbes picked up Henry White, colored, at Midlothian on a charge of unlawfully riding a train. He was brought along with the other negroes and placed in jail.

MERCHANTS ORGANIZE.

Retail Dealers Form Organization and Elect Officers for Year.

Representatives of between forty and fifty retail business establishments of Waxahachie met in the Woodmen of the World hall Monday night and permanently organized the Retail Merchants' Association. The organization will be affiliated with other associations of retail merchants of the state. Officers for the first year were elected as follows:

S. W. Durham, president; T. B. Engledow, vice president; W. P. Hood, treasurer.

Following is the personnel of the board of directors: Frank Rogers, D. H. Thompson, W. B. Howell, J. E. Plummer, S. P. Spalding, John Munroe.

A committee on constitution and by-laws was appointed as follows: P. P. Smith, chairman; S. P. Spalding, J. S. Campbell.

The association will meet next Monday night to hear the report of the above named committee.

All retail dealers, professional men, bankers and insurance agents who have dealings with the retail trade are eligible to membership and are invited to join.

Ed Young Draws Two Years.

Ed Young, colored, appeared in the district court Tuesday morning and entered a plea of guilty to a charge of forgery and passing forged instruments. The jury gave him a term of two years in the penitentiary.

ASYLUM TRAGEDY GUARDS ARRESTED

Two Nightwatchmen Must Answer for B. F. Roberts' Death.

THE AFFAIR IS A MYSTERY

Newly Admitted Patient From Lubbock Found With Chest Crushed In and Five Ribs Broken. Death Soon Results.

Terrell, Texas, March 26.—As the culmination of inquest proceedings held at the North Texas Hospital for the Insane Sunday, warrants were issued for the arrest of H. L. Faubion and J. S. Arant, night watchmen at the institution, charged with causing the death of B. F. Roberts, a patient at the asylum. The night watchmen were placed under arrest and allowed bond in the sum of \$300 each, which they gave. Justice T. L. Frank set Wednesday as the time for their preliminary hearing.

B. F. Roberts was a new patient at the institution, having been received only last Saturday from Lubbock county. He was discovered some time Saturday night with his chest bruised and five ribs broken. He succumbed to these injuries about 11 o'clock Sunday morning.

Justice Frank, County Attorney Bass and Sheriff Crane were notified and conducted the inquest Sunday, following which the arrest of the night watchmen followed.

VETERAN HAS TWO WIVES.

He Wants One of Them on Pension List of the State.

Austin, Texas, March 26.—Quite an unusual letter has been received by Captain E. A. Bolmes, chief of the pension bureau in the comptroller's department, from an applicant for a pension. The letter comes from a central Texas county. The writer frankly admits that he has two wives living and has raised a family by each, and wants to know, if he is entitled to a pension, which one of his wives comes in for a pension. He further states that he has been living with his last wife for the past 16 years. Captain Bolmes said he replied to the writer by telling him that if anyone was entitled to a pension, it would be him.

Offering "Booze" at Cut Rate.

MOB HANGS NEGRO AT DAWSON

Summary Vengeance Is Dealt Negro Who Insulted a White Woman.

Dawson, Texas, March 26.—A crowd of about 200 men took Joe Redden, a negro, from the city calaboose at 8 o'clock last night and hanged him to a telephone pole near the postoffice. Early in the afternoon he offered an insult to a white woman, two miles southeast of Dawson. He was captured at once by a neighbor and brought to town.

Groups of men kept watch on the jail and talked over the case.

At dark the crowd increased rapidly, but quietly, and the action taken was quiet and orderly.

In thirty minutes the negro was dead and the crowd dispersed as orderly as it gathered.

PLACE OF MEETING IS CHANGED

Conference of Waxahachie District Will Be Held in This City.

The district conference for the Waxahachie district was to meet at Milford Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, but on Monday it became necessary to change the place of meeting to Waxahachie. In explaining why this change was made Dr. T. S. Armstrong, presiding elder of the district, said:

"Yesterday I was notified that smallpox was in the town of Milford and of course they could not entertain the conference. The time being so short I could not make arrangements to entertain it in any other town, so there was but one thing to do, that was to bring it to Waxahachie. Calling the official board of the church together I laid the case before them and they agreed to entertain the conference if the ladies would consent. Of course they did and so the district conference will convene in the Methodist church at 2 o'clock p. m., Thursday. The business sessions will be held in the mornings and afternoons during the remainder of the week. Bishop Key will preside over the conference and the sessions will be interesting, as important business will be attended to. The bishop will preach Sunday and Sunday night. Everybody should hear him. The occasion will be a great one and the membership of the Methodist church should take advantage of this opportunity. There will be preaching each day at 11 a. m. and 8 p. m. We are sure that the homes of the Methodist membership will be thrown open to entertain these guests."

Corn Products Refining Company.

New York, March 26.—The recent merger of subsidiary corporations having necessitated the election of a new set of officers, the annual meeting held today is attending to that duty. For the first time since the panic, has started all its plants on full time. This move has been made necessary by the large increase in the volume of orders received by the corporation during the past few weeks. Moreover, it is claimed that it will be some time before the plants will catch up with the current demand for the company's products. The factories are now grinding about 100,000 bushels of corn per day as against 60,000 per day during the depression.
