TENNESSEE TO GO DRY.
The State Wide Prohibition Law becomes Effective at 12 o'clock Tonight.

Nashville, Tenn., June 30.—Professional sources and occasional tipplers of this city, Memphis and Chattanooga are today chattering in a drinking bout in the beneficent endeavor to consume all the liquor remaining in Tennessee before the state-wide prohibition law goes into effect at midnight tomorrow the "drouth" will cover the state like a pall, except, let it be whispered, in the neighborhood of certain social clubs which have been organized by the "good fellows" of the larger cities.

Nashville is already well supplied with "clubs," but to make sure of having enough to accommodate all comers a number of new clubs have been organized, so when the open season opens the command of the law at 12 o'clock tonight, just twenty-one "social clubs" will throw open their doors here and deal out to the members portions of the liquor, beer, etc., each is supposed to have purchased and left in the locker there. The law will permit this.

Over in Memphis, where more than 1,000 saloons will have to go out of business, more than 100 clubs will be in working order by tonight, so there will be no dry ones there if they can afford the price of membership, which has been made rather reasonable.

The smaller towns are not to be left, however, and over fifty charters have been granted by the secretary of state for so-called social clubs in the country towns. Towns that have been in the dry column for a number of years are now to have their social clubs.

The Tennessee prohibition law is the culmination of the bitterest political fight in the state's history. Former United States Senator E. W. Carmack was the leading figure in the "dry" ranks, and his assassination is alleged to have been due to the strenuous part he played in the prohibition campaign.

The prohibition law was passed over the veto of Governor Patterson. Prohibition was the principal issue in the contest between Governor Patterson and the late E. W. Carmack for the democratic gubernatorial nomination, and though Patterson, who advocated the local option, won the nomination, the legislature after stormy times, went against him. This came, however, with the aid of republicans.

CHARBON IN TEXAS.
Jefferson and Orange Counties the Scene of Losses of Stock.
Beaumont, Texas, June 30.—Charbon has appeared among the stock of this county and is having deadly effect. Former Mayor Drummond of Port Arthur has lost a number of mules. Reports from over the county indicate that the disease is rapidly spreading among stock.
Every effort is being made by the authorities to stamp it out. A similar condition prevails in Orange county and in the extreme section of Southwest Louisiana.
Governor Campbell stated that the state would make an effort to stamp out the disease.
