Million Miners May Go Out.

London, July 27.—Great Britain is threatened with the most serious labor trouble that the country has experienced in years, because of the desire of members of the Miners' Confederation to go on a national strike in support of the Scottish miners who are resisting a wage reduction of six pence a day. Ballotting among the million members of the confederation was completed today and the executive committee of the organization will meet tomorrow to take action on the result. The present feeling seems to be in favor of the stoppage of all mines, a condition which would entail practically the complete paralysis of the British industry. In view of the consequent expected shortage in the coal supply many factories have already served notice to their employees of the termination of contracts.

### CHAUTAQUA TO BE CONTINUED

#### Board Decides Not to Abandon the Annual Summer Encampment.

Here is a bit of good news for the friends of the Chautauqua.

Announcement has been made that this popular summer encampment is to be continued.

Encouraged by the splendid attendance which has marked the present session of the assembly the directors have voted to make it a permanent fixture.

When the Chautauqua was moved here from Glen Rose a lease of ten years was secured on the grounds where the annual encampments have been held. This lease expired with the present encampment but arrangements have been made whereby this popular institution is to be continued here. This is the only Chautauqua in Texas that is conducted along the lines of the parent institution, Lake Chautauqua, N. Y., and the efforts of the management to perpetuate it should meet with the hearty support not only of the Texas Synod of the American Presbyterian church, but of the citizens of Waxahachie as well.

At the Sunday school convention Monday afternoon Mr. W. C. North delivered an interesting lecture on "Music in the Sunday School." Mr. North urged that only such songs as appealed to the children be used in the Sunday school. He said that above all things there should be harmony in the Sunday school, and favored the use of musical instruments in this worship.

At 4 o'clock Mr. W. N. Wiggins lectured on the subject of "Teachers' Meeting."

At 8:30 in the evening a delightful entertainment was given by Miss Emma Randle, a versatile reader and impersonator. Miss Randle was heard by a large audience and the collection of readings which she gave was pleasing to every one. She is graceful on the stage and there is a subtlety in her humor that is delightfully charming. Her selections on this occasion were most sparkling little comedies, but she gave a scene from "Macbeth" in which she depicted the unhappy queen in quite a realistic manner.
