THE WORK BEING HURRIED
Arrangements Being Completed for Opening of Chautauqua.

West End park is still a scene of considerable activity. A large force of carpenters and painters is at work this week, pushing the auditorium to completion. The ceiling has been completed and the roof and exterior of the building painted. According to the first plans the floor space near the stage was to have been covered with gravel but this week the directors decided to have the entire floor constructed of plank and this week is now being done. Wednesday afternoon the building committee met Mr. Strickland at the auditorium to arrange plans for lighting the building.

The rear end of the old pavilion has been converted into a dining hall, with a cook room adjoining. The work of clearing out the undergrowth and trimming up the trees in the grove across the creek has

been completed, making of this a very pretty addition to the park. The trees on this side have undergone a pruning which adds much to the beauty of the scene.

A water pipe has been laid to the park which insures campers an abundance of artesian water this summer. A large portable reservoir has been erected on the hill where plenty of drinking water will keep, and in the bank of the creek a large box containing coil pipe has been so arranged that there will be an abundance of ice water always on hand.

Mrs. H. H. Dunn has had a small cottage moved into the park and located in the edge of the grove where she will camp and entertain her friends while the Chautauqua is in session.

Lots for campers have already been staked off and nine tents were sent out to the park this morning to be stretched. People from Ennis, Corsicana, Hillsboro, Waco and many other near by towns will camp there this year. And in addition to campers from a distance quite a number of Waxahachie fam-

ilies will make their homes on the grounds during the session.

Another valuable improvement to the park is the new fence that is being constructed around it. This

fence is made of red palings and is considered one of the most durable fences that can be constructed.

While improvements have been going on at the park the street railway people have been making some needed repairs on the car line which very materially strengthens it for handling the large crowds that will be here next week. A great many new ties have been put down and low places in the track raised. The little park in West Main street has also been pruned and the weeds cut down.

On next Tuesday night the third annual meeting of the Waxahachie Chautauqua and Summer Assembly will be formally opened by Mr. Frank Cottern, of Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. Cottern is director of the Chautauqua Extension Bureau, and with the aid of his stereopticon will give us some magnificent views, teaching valuable lessons of the great educational movement.

Prof. Fred High, of Pittsburg, Pa., will be on hand four afternoons. Mr. High is a natural humorist and a successful entertainer.

On next Wednesday night Prof. Chas. Lane, Georgia's famous humorist, will deliver a very catchy lecture on the "Analysis of Laughter". As a humorist and entertaining lecturer he ranks among the best on the American platform.

The lecture of Dr. E. Benjamin Andrews on Thursday evening, July 24th, at 8 o'clock, on "Robert E. Lee" promises to be a rare intellectual treat. This lecture is a scholarly delineation of the character of Virginia's son and the South's idol. This lecture will be made a special event for Confederate veterans of Ellis county. Dr. Andrews will also appear Friday evening, following in a lecture on "George Washington."

Dr. Andrews will be followed on the platform by Dr. Samuel Phelps

Leland, of Chicago. Dr. Leland has been on the lecture platform twenty years, and is an orator and speaker of national reputation. His lecture will be "The Story of Science."

Rev. H. W. Sears, familiarly known as the "tally man," is on the program for a lecture on "Grumbler and their Cure." Rev. Sears is from Lincoln, Ill., but formerly lived at Sherman. It is said that he can out smile the man in the moon.

The last attraction on the program will be the appearance of Hon. Henry Watterson in a lecture on "Abraham Lincoln". Mr. Watterson is editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal and is one of the brainiest editorial writers in America. This will be one of the best attractions of the entire program and for this event the railroads will give a special rate independent of the certificate plan for the benefit of Chautauqua visitors.

Route Inspector Here.

On account of the great number of rural mail routes being established all over the country the matter of introducing the system in the country surrounding Waxahachie has been greatly delayed. Recently the divisions were rearranged and more inspectors employed by the government that the work of establishing routes might be greatly facilitated. Mr. H. H. Colclazer, route inspector with headquarters at St. Louis, arrived in the city last night to make an inspection of the routes recently arranged by Postmaster Beatty. He and Mr. Beatty left the city early this morning on a tour of inspection and will continue the work until all routes have been gone over, which will probably require about ten days. After this matter has been definitely settled an examination for rural route carriers will be held. It is hoped to have full service in operation by September 1.
