Save the Birds

J. W. Neil, of the State Agricultural Department was here Wednesday, and left in the afternoon for his farm eighteen miles northwest of town. He will return Saturday and in the afternoon will address the citizens of Howard county on the boll worm and how to destroy it and other insects that destroy the crops. He says the people are making a great mistake in killing the birds as they are a great protection to crops as they destroy the worms, grasshoppers and other insects feed upon cotton and other crops. Birds, he says are the natural protectors vegetation has from these pests and should be protected. He has several timely and interesting suggestions to make to the agriculturists of this part of Texas and we hope everyone who can will hear him Saturday. —Big Springs Enterprise.

Mr. Neil, while in Lubbock several weeks ago addressed an audience of farmers and business men along agricultural lines and touched on this important question. His reasons for wanting to protect the birds are practical and wise and should be looked after immediately.

Anti Sea Sick Ship

The Emperor, the biggest ship in the world, is to be equipped with anti-seasickness decks. This gigantic 900-foot steamer now being built at Hamburg, Germany, for the Hamburg-American Line will, when completed, not only be the largest vessel in the world, but will in addition insure her passengers against the terrors of seasickness. This happy condition is to be brought about by the installation of the Frahn decks on board the steamer, a device that reduces the motion of a ship to the minimum. It has been tried out by the company on a small ship and, so it is said, has reduced the vacillation in heavy weather from 83 to 9 degrees. In case of a craft of the size of the Emperor it is believed that these 3 degrees will be eliminated altogether. The colossus will reach this country in the spring of 1913. The exact date of her launching has not been set. She is 50,000 tons displacement and nearly 900 feet in length. There are nine decks above the waterline. She will not be a fast boat, being built more for solid comfort than for speed. Her time across the Atlantic will be in the neighborhood of seven days. Her engines are of the reciprocating type. She has accommodations for 4,250 passengers of all classes and carries a crew of 1,000. Among the special features of construction will be a reproduction of ancient Roman baths in bronze, marble and ivory; a roof garden, squash courts, gymna-

sium, swimming pool, rathskeller, library, lounging room and other provisions for entertainment and comfort.
