Says Million Bales Lost

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 19. - A loss of over 1,000,000 bales of cotton was caused by a week of hot and dry days this month, is the news which Charles S. Barrett, president of the Farmers' Union, brings back to Atlanta with him after a trip which has kept him on the road since July 22. During that time he has gone back and forth across the cotton belt several times, and he has made personal investigations in addition to reports which he has received.

Mr. Barrett points out that the cotton crop is made during August and that while the crop is being made the weather conditions must be ideal in order for expectations to be fully realized. Instead of the ideal weather, there was about a week of intensely hot and dry days, and this is where, Barrett says, over 1,000,000 bales were lost. Speaking of his trip, Barrett said he had received assurances from every section of the State, from Boards of Trade, Farmers, Financiers and others, that the crop would be held.
