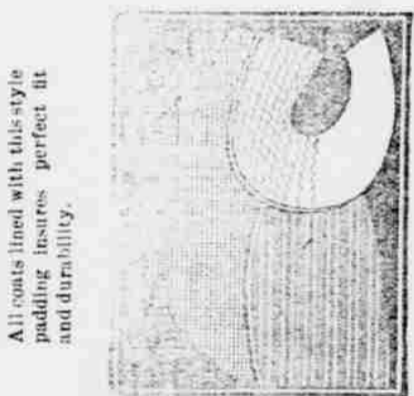

Do 'ing the Issue.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The government has today taken the responsibility for an outbreak on the frontier and is still clinging to the hope of peace. Messengers were sent to Colombia to prevent a declaration of war by Turkey.

The War is On.

LONDON, April 12.—There is no doubt of actual war with Greece-Turkish frontier, the boom of cannon is heard at Larissa, and the Greek flag flies on Mount Olympus, in Turkish territory. Greek troops are pouring south to the frontier and the Turkish camps the center of great excitement, and active preparations for a conflict.

CHICAGO, April 12.—May 15 is set apart by the people as Chicago cleaning up day. Business is to be suspended on that day, and men, women and children will give the streets, alleys, vacant lots, yards, etc., a general scouring.

CONGRESSIONAL NOTES.

Talk of Taking Carnegie's Armor Plate Plant.

THE ARMOR PLATE BILLS.

Sizing Up the Situation on a Vote on the Dingley Tariff Bill—It is Now Thought the Republicans Will Have Enough Votes to Pass the Bill.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Senator Chandler introduced two bills in the senate today: one authorizes the government to take possession of the Bethlehem and Carnegie armor plate plants for the manufacture of their own armor, and leaving the owners to seek redress through the court of claims; the second provides for plants at any future time.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The southern sentiment in the senate as it was in the house during the discussion of the tariff bill. Appeals are coming in from the south to the finance committee of the senate asking for higher rates than those already fixed by the bill on cotton, rice, sugar, oranges, pineapples and other fruits; tobacco, lumber, iron, bauxite are among the items named for which appeals are being made by the southern men.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—It was announced this morning that the former Queen Lilioukani's mission to the United States was simply to secure an audience from the McKinley administration in the matter of the Dole regime in Hawaii, pronouncing it illegal in ordering a new election. The queen desires a restoration of the monarchy, and she says, "I will give a fair election the Hawaiian, she says, would choose her president."

Senator Voorhees' Funeral.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The funeral of Senator Voorhees was held at St. John's Episcopal church today in the presence of a very large and distinguished gathering.
