BURGLARS BREAK MANY WINDOWS

Stores Robbed by Gang of "Plate Glass Burglars;" \$250 Shawl Stolen.

"Plate glass burglars" were busy Friday night and five plate glass windows were broken in the business district by the burglars. The Grand Leader store, at 218 South El Paso street, was entered by breaking the window. Fifteen watches, 18 rings, two suits, 12 pairs of gloves, five men's coats, 12 pairs of shoes, 12 silk undershirts, 24 shirts, seven pairs of women's shoes were taken.

The Grand Leader store at the corner of Broadway and Overland streets, had a hole broken in the plate glass window and sweaters pulled through the hole. The Model store at Overland and Broadway was also robbed Friday night by having a hole cut in the window. Nothing of value was missed, however.

CATRON AGAINST EQUAL SUFFRAGE

Turns Down Women; Says They Are Child Bearers and Suffrage Failure.

Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 22.—Santa Fe had its first suffrage parade when 150 women in automobiles proceeded to the residence of U. S. senator Thomas B. Catron. At the Catron residence, Miss Aurora Lucero, daughter of the secretary of state, made a plea for woman's suffrage. She was followed by Mrs. Rupert F. Aplund, president of the New Mexico Federation of Women's Clubs. Mrs. Francis C. Wilson, who headed the delegation, also spoke, and Mrs. E. St. Clair Thompson eloquently summed up the arguments.

However, senator Catron remained unconvinced, and told the visitors that "it looks to me as if you are asking me to do something not exactly right when you ask me to go to Washington to help pass an amendment to give the ballot to people who have stated plainly that they don't want it."

FORM TRUST FOR FOREIGN TRADE

American Organidatoin To Handle American Trade Abroad.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 22.—Formation of an American Trust company, similar in organization to The Netherland Overseas Trust to handle American products abroad with assurance that they will not reach the belligerents, was announced today by secretary Redfield of the department of commerce. The company will have the official recognition of the government.

Secretary Redfield said it was contemplated to have the company handle all export shipments from the United States to neutral countries. He said that while the government would not officially guarantee the belligerent countries that the goods shipped under agreement with the American company would not reach their hands, the government would exercise such supervision as would insure a complete neutrality of the commerce. In considering such official recognition by the government for the new concern, it was made a condition that the company must handle the export business of all American firms which might make application, provided they could meet the conditions laid down by the belligerent countries with which the concern might operate. The understanding was reached that agents of the treasury department in export cities in the United States and commercial agents of the department of commerce abroad agree to cooperate to assure the complete neutrality of all transactions handled through the concern.
