

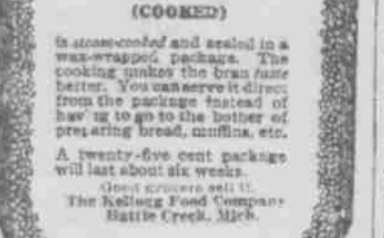
ELKS AT WORK FOR MINSTRELS

CONTRACTOR MORGAN PUTS FIVE NON-UNION CARPENTERS TO WORK MONDAY.

Five non-union carpenters were put to work Monday morning by J. E. Morgan, contractor for the building of the county court house to take the place of some of the union carpenters who, with the iron workers, walked out.

"I waited until nine o'clock this morning for the union men to return, and when none showed up I put five non-union men on the job," said Mr. Morgan Monday morning. "I have not employed any other men to take the places of the men who quit. I am ahead of time on the contract, and can wait."

FIRES AT POST TO BE PROBED

Gen. Bell Orders Investigation of Burning of Army Stores and Horses.

Brig. Gen. George T. Bell, Jr., commanding the United States troops on the border, has detailed a board of officers to conduct an investigation concerning two fires at Fort Bliss Saturday night, in which army equipment valued at more than \$3000 was destroyed. The fires started about two hours apart, the first in the storeroom of company K, 20th infantry, and the second in stables of the Eighth cavalry. Officers at the post decline to commit themselves as to the theory that the fires were of incendiary origin, but reports have gone out to the effect that it was a deliberate attempt to destroy army provisions and ammunition.

Three Jurors Chosen in the 34th District Court; Trial to Last This Week.

The selection of a jury for the second trial of Donald Mackey, charged with the murder of Scott Vance, an El Paso & Southwestern railroad conductor, in the El Paso restaurant on the evening of November 24, 1915, started in the 34th district court Monday morning. At noon G. M. Baker, A. G. Mosley and W. J. Sheridan had been empaneled. Mackey was tried during the January term of the court, the result being a hung jury. It is anticipated that the present trial will consume the greater part of the week.

Water supply poor.

While the government paid for the sinking of several good wells at Fort Bliss a couple of years ago, these wells have never been connected with the reservoir at the post. Work of connecting them is now under way and by the first of September the post will have a permanent water supply with a good pressure. At present, the post water supply is secured from the city through a four inch pipe. All the fire hydrants in the post have smaller connections than those of the city, hence only hose purchased for use at the fort is available in fire fighting in the reservation.

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15,000 AT WAGO SEE NEGRO BURN

Texas City Pulls Lynching Public; Women Present in the Mob.

Waco, Texas, May 15.—With 15,000 persons as witnesses, including women and children, Jesse Washington, a negro boy, who confessed to a criminal assault upon and murder of Mrs. Lucy Fryar, seven miles south of here last Monday, was taken from the fifth district court room today and burned in the public square.

The burning came immediately after the negro's trial had ended and after the jury had returned a verdict of guilty, giving him the death penalty. Some one not far from the negro started the cry of "get the negro," and Washington was seized. A suggestion that he be burned on the plaza met with instant response, and he was dragged to the city hall yard, where a chair, already around his neck, was thrown over a little tree. Wood was secured and the fire started.

About 1 o'clock members of the mob put the charred body in a sack and man on horseback dragged it through the principal streets. The horseman then headed in the direction of Robinson, where the woman was murdered.
