

CHAMBER PLANS BIGGER EFFORTS

Suggestions for enlargement of the number of members in 1920 are contained in a special report made Thursday by R. M. Roberts, manager of the chamber.

One of the suggestions is that the chairman of each department be made a member of the board of directors so that intimate touch may be kept between general management and sectional operation.

Women In U. S. Have Freedom, Says Miss Swift

Relation between the freedom of women and architecture was the theme of a lecture which Miss Helen Hubbard Swift, director of the home economics bureau, gave Thursday afternoon before the City Federation of Women's Clubs at the Knobel club.

Miss Swift said that the history of homes in various periods of the world's history, she says that among the Greeks the women never got out of doors, consequently her home was virtually a prison, and had to be built to confine the women of the household.

Under no circumstances, Miss Swift said, could the women enter the courts and apartments of the men. When they wanted to get something from the store, they sent a slave after it. And only one man, the head of the household, had access to the women's quarters.

Among the Romans, a little later, the Greeks held a little more freedom. Consequently there was a change of architecture to accommodate the program.

Women in England, the lecturer said, reached the pinnacle of freedom and the houses were large, airy and sunny. Women were allowed plenty of liberty to go and come as they pleased.

French May Be Relieved In Kidnaping Case

Tombstone, Ariz., Feb. 12.—An outside attorney to prosecute the 319 defendants in the Blaine deportation case, probably will be employed to relieve county attorney Robert N. French, because of his illness, it became known here today.

French, according to reports, is unable to ask relief from prosecuting the cases, one of which, that of Henry J. Weatman, Blaine hardware dealer, being now on trial. French was to decide the matter definitely today.

25 Talsmen Examined. Examination of the last venire was progressing rapidly under French and defense attorneys today. During the first hour of court, 25 men were examined and excused.

All declared they had fixed opinions regarding the right or wrong of the deportations. Less than 25 talsmen remained to be examined from the venire, and a new one will have to be drawn this afternoon.

During the recess, and possibly this afternoon, it is believed Judge Samuel L. Patten would hear two local cases which have resulted since the trial of Weatman began and both connected indirectly with the deportation cases.

MAY BAR CORN FROM MEXICO

Washington, D. C., Feb. 12.—To prevent the entry of the pink boll worm into this country, the U. S. department of agriculture has issued orders to prohibit or restrict the movement of corn from Mexico to the United States.

The secretary of agriculture has given notice of a hearing to be held here at the federal horticultural board, February 17. Persons interested in the proposed quarantine will be heard. The quarantine, if placed, will apply to corn in the raw or manufactured state.

Nearly all corn coming from Mexico, it is said, is likely to have more or less cotton seed mixed with it.
