 "The three primary colors are blue, red and yellow. To obtain a contrasting shade with blue, use the complimentary color made by mixing red and yellow, this gives orange.
 To find the contrasting color of red, mix blue and yellow and we have green. To find the contrasting color of yellow, mix blue and red and we have violet, and to discover all other direct contrasts, mix the two colors of the series. We have, for instance, in the secondary colors, orange, violet, and green, and one may proceed with further experiments as with the primary colors.
 Warm colors, or those having red in them, are needed for a room having a northern exposure or lacking in sunlight.
 Cool colors, or those predominating in blue, for a room having a southern exposure or supplied with sunlight.
 Harmony of contrast, is harmony made up, is contrasting colors.
 Harmony of analogy, is harmony made up, is colors related.
 Colors of contrast are the association of colors diametrically opposed in character. Blue and orange, red and green, yellow and violet, are examples in contrast.

FUNERAL OF DR. DAVIS TO BE HELD TOMORROW.

Dr. Davis Was For Several Years Sur-geon of the Mexican Central, and Lately Has Been in Mining.
 The funeral of Dr. Charles F. Davis will take place from Nagley, Lyons and McBean's undertaking establishment to the church of Immaculate Conception tomorrow at 2:30 p. m. and the body will be buried in Evergreen cemetery.
 Dr. Davis died on Wednesday of last week and the body has been held await-ing the arrival of his nephew, Mr. Cox, a mining man. Mr. Cox arrived today and has made preparations for the body to be buried as above stated.
 Dr. Davis was for several years sur-geon of the Mexican Central railway. For the past twelve years he has been interested in the mining business with Pat Durack. Mr. Durack has been de-termined in straightening up the affairs of Dr. Davis and will turn everything over to his heirs.
 Deceased has made his home in Juar-ez with Louis Fenchler for the past several years.

LONDON, April 2.—The retirement of Lord Salisbury will take place as soon as the budget speeches have been delivered, this civil list sanctioned, and financial support for the fiscal year ar-ranged. It is reported on high au-thority that Balfour will be elevated to the peerage and will succeed his uncle as prime minister.
