COURT OF APPEALS.

Synopsis of Decisions Rendered at the Present Term of the Court.

TYLER, TEX., Oct. 25.—Charlie McCollum vs. the State; from Cooke. Theft from the person. 1. Where the evidence shows that an absent witness is a transient person traveling from place to place, but most of the time in this state, this evidence would not lay a sufficient predicate for the reading of the statement of the witness made at an examining trial, said statement being admitted in evidence on the ground that the witness resided out of the state. The admission of the statement was error. Reversed and remanded. White, P. J.

Sam Massey vs. the state; from Parker. Theft of cattle. 1. It was error in the trial court to charge the jury upon the law of principals, there being no evidence to warrant the charge and same being promptly excepted to by appellant. The charge possibly impressed the jury that appellant's two witnesses were acting with him, when there was no charge against them for the offense, and thereby tendered against their credit as witnesses. Reversed and remanded. Hort, J.

Prince Carr vs. the State; from Titus. Aggravated assault and battery. 1. Because the statement of facts shows no venue, the case is reversed and remanded. Wilson, J.

Albert Leeper vs. the State; from Coryell. Offense to bring a witness. 1. The appellant being charged with the commission of an offense, by aiding and encouraging his principal, McDaniel, an abstract charge as to accomplice testimony was insufficient to charge the jury directly apply the instruction to the issue of the guilt of the principal, McDaniel, and under the peculiar facts of this case the charge given merely in the abstract was reversible error. Reversed and remanded. Wilson, J.

Timan Johnson vs. the state, from Limestone; murder in first degree with life penalty. The indictment charged murder by means of poison placed in water, but the court did not err by permitting the state to prove that deceased was poisoned at the same time by drinking poisoned coffee. It was immaterial how the poison was administered, as the manner of its administration is not descriptive of the offense and need not be proved strictly as mentioned in the indictment. (20 app. 109). 2. It being the theory of the state that appellant and one Wood conspired together to poison the brother of deceased; that they went to the house for that purpose, and acted together in placing the poison in the water and coffee, we think the court erred in refusing to permit appellant to prove that immediately before he and Wood went to the house on the evening of the poisoning, Wood requested appellant to go with him to said house, and that it was after some hesitation and persuasion that appellant did so.

Cy Porter vs. State, from Bowie. Aggravated assault and battery. 1. The evidence shows that the assault was committed with a deadly weapon. 2. Charge full and correct. 3. The fine of \$500 was not excessive. Affirmed. Wilson, J.

Bill Pitts vs. the State, from Jack. Theft of property of over \$50 in value. 1. Where property is owned either in common or jointly by two or more persons the ownership may be alleged in all or either of them. 2. Defendant is entitled to a new trial because of the absence of testimony, which was certainly material and probably true. Reversed and remanded. Wilson, J.
