

BRITISH PEER GETS DIVORCE FROM ACTRESS

EDINBURGH, Scotland, Dec. 22. (P)—The court of session today granted Lord Inverclyde, British shipping magnate, a divorce from Lady Inverclyde—the actress, June Tripp.

Their wedding in 1929 was one of the outstanding social events of the season, but the marriage was dissolved at Reno, Nev., in 1931, when Lady Inverclyde was awarded a decree by default.

At that time, she expressed the hope Lord Inverclyde would "play the gentleman and divorce me in England, so that I can not be prosecuted for bigamy in my native land should I remarry and return there."

Reno decrees are not recognized in Great Britain.

The petition on which Lord Inverclyde obtained his divorce was directed against Lady Inverclyde and Mathew Bartholomew Anthony Paanakker.

The ground of the action was alleged infidelity and the court was asked to find "the facts and circumstances and qualifications proven relevant to infer the defendants guilty of adultery."

It was stated in the petition that the alleged misconduct occurred during September and October of 1932 in Lady Inverclyde's flat and also in Paanakker's apartment in London.

Both Lady Inverclyde and Paanakker denied the allegations.

EXPERTS AT CONFLICT OVER SILVER RESULTS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (P)—Addition of silver to the money base, a primary result of the president's project to buy the nation's silver production, is seen by experts who have advised on the current gold policy, as a means of attaining the dollar of constant purchasing power advocated by the president.

The more immediate and obvious effects of silver purchases will be to add some \$15,000,000 in silver to the \$29,000,000 now in circulation, and many economists agree, to stimulate temporarily, at least commodity and security prices.

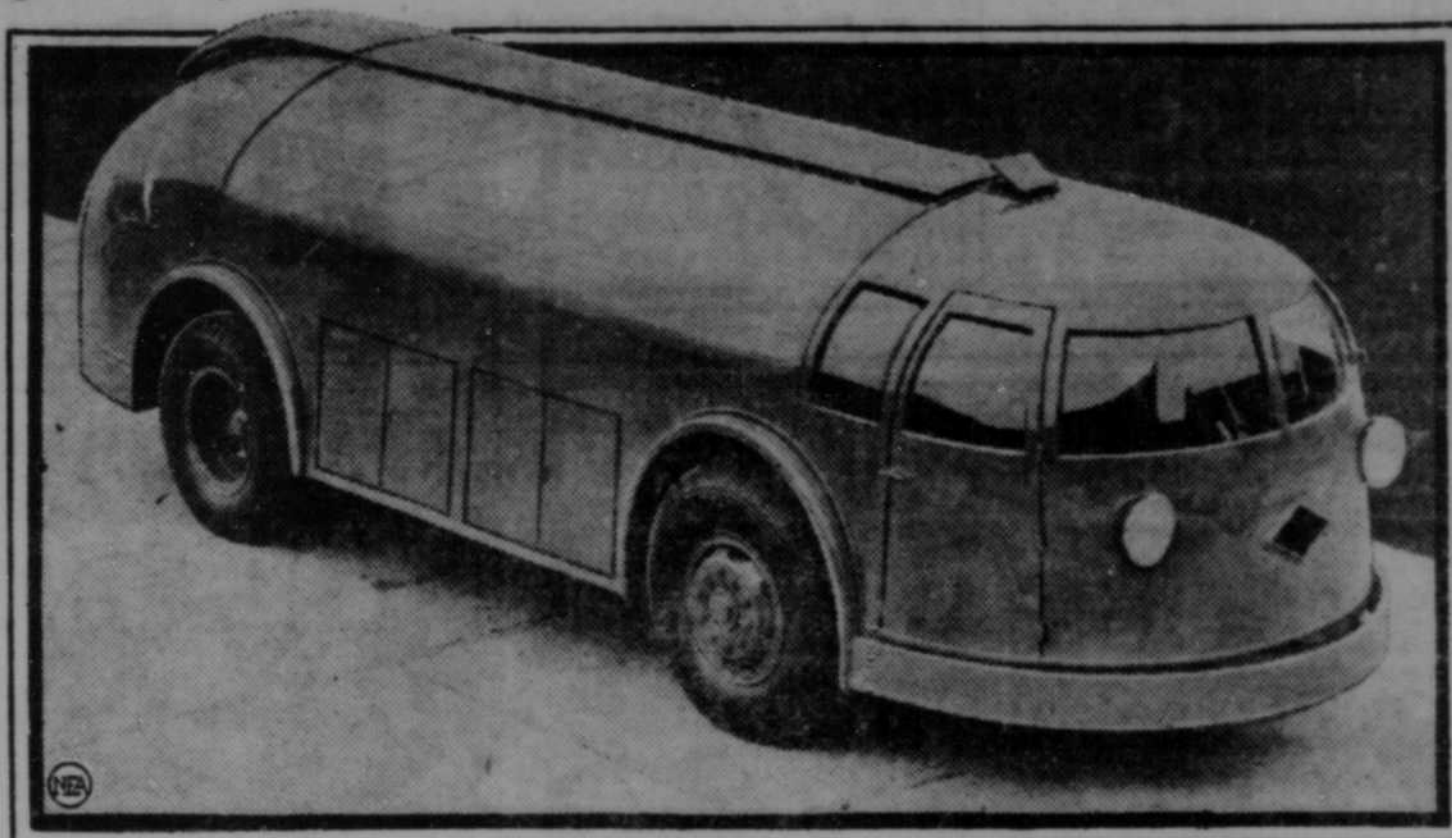
Arguments Arise

Beyond these two consequences, experts find themselves in conflict on almost every point.

The argument ranges from absolute denial that silver remonetization will affect prices for more than a few days to the statements of men such as Prof. G. F. Warren, one of the major influences back of present money policies, that by altering silver along with gold prices any desired commodity price level may be attained.

book "Prices," envisaged the use of silver as money with gold, and the varying of the relations between them so as to provide a more stable money based on two precious metals instead of one.

Want New Relationship

By law, it takes about sixteen dollars to buy one gold dollar. In fact, however, it would take about 50 ounces of silver to buy one ounce of gold. The price of silver on the new government market at 64.5 cents an ounce is but one-fiftieth of the government's \$34 gold price.

A silver dollar will buy considerably more than a dollar's worth of silver, even with silver priced at 64.5 cents, which is about 20 cents above the current open market price. A silver dollar, in effect, is worth a dollar because it is made so by law.

Thus the current actual intrinsic relationship between gold and silver is 50 to 1. Warren has suggested a ratio of something like 20 to 1.

The president's proclamation places no limit on the amount of silver which may be purchased, although a least 24,000,000 ounces must be taken off the market. Were the entire silver production absorbed, its price in open markets would tend to rise spectacularly, but the government's ability to dump silver on the market at any time, it is argued, probably would serve to maintain any desired relationship between it and gold.

\$15,000,000 Addition

At the direct addition of \$15,000,000 to the circulating medium in one year, which would result from the present plan, would have a negligible effect on prices, is generally agreed. Further general acceptance is found for the idea that silver and other miners will benefit considerably, making a direct profit of about \$5,000,000 on the rise in price.

lams, anti-Long candidate already actively campaigning.

Klorer's resignation also started rumors that he had broken with Long over his refusal to head a Long ticket, but there was no confirmation to either rumor.

Long broke with Walmisley and the mayor's old regulars over control of the old regular ticket at a time when at least half of the state's congressional districts were whipping up mass meetings in protest against the way Mrs. Bolivar E. Kemp was selected as representative from the sixth district with Long's support in an election without a primary.

Rap 'Dictatorship'

Today citizens mass meetings in the sixth, fourth, fifth, and second districts were mobilized by mass meetings in a declared war against the "dictatorship" of Long and a movement seeking to wrest the state from "political domination" and "return it to rule by the people."

District wide mass meetings at Shreveport, Monroe, and New Orleans, in the fourth, fifth, and second congressional districts respectively, adopted resolutions which amounted to declarations of war in politics and demanded the resignations of the two U. S. senators, the governor, lieutenant governor and other state officials on charges of corruption.

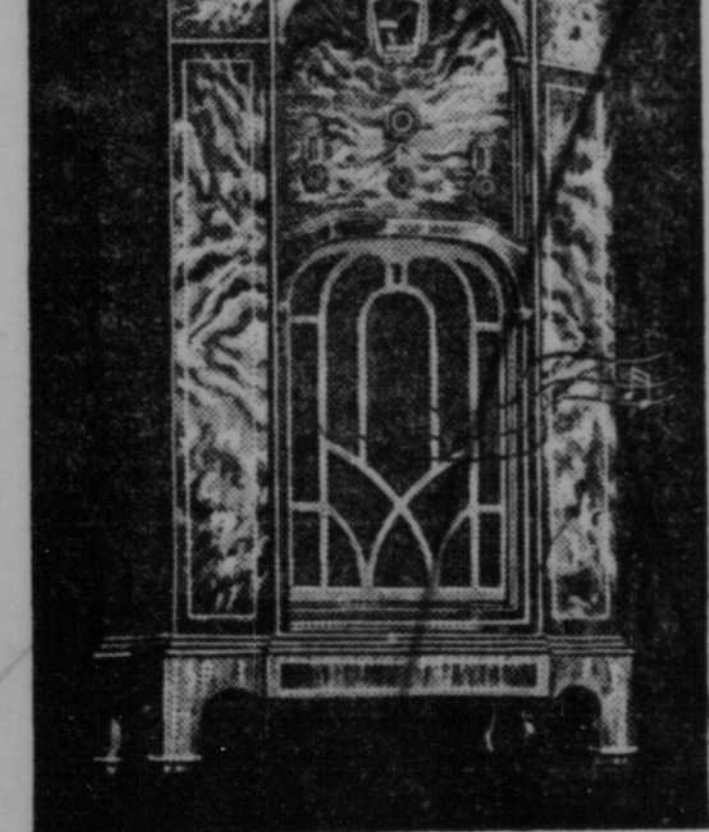
